3 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Colors of our nation in
4 place, hand salute. Two.

5 . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

6 We will now have an invocation by Department
7 Chaplain Ron Distel.

8 CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Good morning, everyone.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

10 CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Let us pray.

11 Lord, we know that we should live our lives by
12 the power of love. Jesus demonstrated total love as
13 he walked the earth and shared His love with the
14 people. Those with power, Lord, were scared of his
15 message. They pursued and achieved his demise.

16 Give us strength and wisdom, Lord, as we
17 realize that when the power of love overwhelms the
18 love of power we will have true peace, and to You we
19 pray for.

20 Amen.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

22 BY COMMANDER WHATLEY: We will have the Pledge of
23 Allegiance by 1st Vice Commander Stan Oren,
24 concluding with the POW/MIA.

25 . . . PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY ASSEMBLY . . .

1 1VC OREN: Resolution 288, adopted by the 67th
2 American Legion National Convention, calls for the
3 designating of an empty chair placed at all
4 meetings, official meetings, of The American Legion,
5 as a physical symbol of the thousands of American
6 POW/MIAs still unaccounted for from all wars and
7 conflicts involving the United States of America.

8 This is a reminder for all of us to spare no
9 effort to secure the release of any American
10 prisoner from captivity, repatriation of all remains
11 of those who died bravely in defense of liberty, and
12 a full accounting of the missing. Let us rededicate
13 ourselves for this vital endeavor.

14 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Preamble, Gary Cox, Jr.,
15 2nd Vice Commander.

16 Cover, please.

18 COMMANDER SCHMITT: Roll call, JD Robinson
19 Department Adjutant.

20 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Good morning, everybody.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

22 . . . ROLL CALL CONDUCTED . . .

23 Commander, you have a quorum.

24 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

25 Introduction of guests by my Sergeant-at-Arms

1 Mike Blackwell.

2 Good morning, everybody.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

4 SGT-AT-ARMS BLACKWELL: All right, today we
5 have our National Vice Commander from the Central
6 Region, Rodger Mathison.

7 (Applause).

8 Larry Stottsberry, 10th District
9 Sergeant-at-Arms; Bob Klostermeier, Past NEC; Terry
10 Veach, a member from 523; Doug Russell, Assistant
11 Judge Advocate; Bob White, Assistant Chaplain; Al
12 Beyer, Department Historian; Kevin Conlan, 2nd Vice,
13 13th District; Tom Tierney, 2nd District Past
14 Commander; Doug Eckert, at-large 888 member, I spoke
15 to him a little bit; Mel Cantrell, 6th District
16 Chaplain; Dennis Teynor, 5th District Past
17 Commander; Ty Bowers, 5th District Chaplain; and
18 Steve Masowick, Past NEC.

19 That is all, I believe.

20 Anybody I missed?

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

22 SGT-AT-ARMS BLACKWELL: Commander, that's the
23 introductions.

24 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you,
25 Sergeant-at-Arms.

1 Reading of the minutes from our previous
2 meeting.

3 I can entertain a motion, since they were sent
4 out to everyone.

5 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd
6 District Commander, so moves.

7 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
8 District, seconds.

9 COMMANDER WHATLEY: The motion has been made
10 correctly.

11 Any discussion?

12 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any discussion?

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any discussion?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, all those for
18 it by saying aye.

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

20 COMMANDER WHATLEY: All those against, no.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

22 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carries.

23 Good morning, everyone. I'm glad to see
24 everybody that could come out today, with all the
25 bad weather that we've been having lately.

1 We have a long day before us today to get a lot
2 of things done. Our lunch will be a working lunch
3 so we can get through this today. Because, after
4 the DEC, the officers here have another commitment.

5 Stan Oren, Department 1st Vice Commander,
6 Membership Chair, Internal Affairs.

7 1VC OREN: Greetings everybody.

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Greetings.

9 1VC OREN: Great to see this full crowd here.

10 Now go out and get me some membership. We're
11 behind Michigan yet. And Gary really doesn't want
12 to wear a Michigan shirt. He's moaning on me. So I
13 need your help. Transfer them 888s in. And find
14 them young ones and get them in. We need them.

15 Thank you.

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

17 Gary Cox, Jr., 2nd Vice Commander, Post
18 activities.

19 2VC COX, JR.: Good morning.

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

21 2VC COX, JR.: O-H.

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: I-O.

23 2VC COX, JR.: That's why I'm not going to wear
24 that shirt. Blue is not my color. I'm a red guy.
25 Just ask any Marine.

1 We've got some Post activities coming up and I
2 will discuss that here in a little bit.

3 But thank you all for coming out. Hopefully
4 you guys get home safely and we'll get some better
5 weather soon.

6 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

7 Holly Lewis, Department Treasurer.

8 TREASURER LEWIS: Thank you.

9 Morning, everybody.

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Morning.

11 TREASURER LEWIS: I wanted to cover just the
12 financials on the investment side, just so you know
13 what's happening there.

14 We currently have a total net worth of
15 \$7,763,985, which is down 109,000 this year.

16 So we do have our investment person coming to
17 our next Finance meeting so that we can discuss what
18 can be done to even that out or get us back on the
19 right track, going up.

20 We are up 82,000 this month. So it is trending
21 in the right way. But, you know, the markets have
22 been a little bit volatile.

23 Any questions on the investments?

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

25 Ken is going to cover the budget versus actual,

1 plus the things that we've been covering on the
2 Finance Commission. I'm more concerned about the
3 revenue side of the house.

4 So a couple of things we've been doing is we've
5 been looking at marketing partnerships. National
6 has done a great job in funneling some people to us
7 that really didn't qualify for a National marketing
8 partnership but could be good for us because they're
9 located in Ohio.

10 So one of those is a company called
11 "Nutrisippy." And we presented this to the Internal
12 Affairs Commission last week. So what they are is a
13 boutique beverage creator. So they are creating an
14 iced tea that is an electrolyte ice tea, to compete
15 with Gatorade. They're out of Cincinnati. They've
16 sent us over terms to look at.

17 One of the things that the Internal Affairs
18 Commission wanted was a taste test. So we are
19 coordinating with them to figure out a Post in
20 Cincinnati that they can come to and do a taste
21 test. So we may be asking some of you to go that,
22 right, and give us your feedback on does it taste
23 good. Right? Because we don't want to get into a
24 partnership with somebody that it doesn't taste
25 good. All right? So that's one thing we're looking

1 at.

2 We do have two meetings on Monday. One with
3 iHeart Radio to talk about some potential
4 advertising that we could do to increase membership
5 in the State of Ohio. So that's one thing that
6 we're looking at.

7 And we also have a meeting with a company
8 called "EPAP," which is also based in Ohio, which
9 does a, they do blankets for towers --

10 FROM THE FLOOR: Tunnels to Towers.

11 TREASURER LEWIS: -- Tunnels to Towers. I
12 always get that messed up. Towers to Tunnels, I
13 always get that messed up.

14 So they do blankets for them. So they're
15 interested in maybe doing some kind of rev share
16 back to us.

17 They also have a program called, "My Primary
18 Pet Care," that they're willing to give us a
19 kickback off of that as well. So we're talking to
20 them on Monday.

21 So if any of you know a business that is
22 located in Ohio that would be interested in doing a
23 partnership of this kind with us, please let us
24 know. We are trying to do anything possible to get
25 some recurring revenue in.

1 And so that brings us to the 50/50.

2 So we had the first month of the 50/50 in
3 March. And we made \$467 for the Department off of
4 that. So the winner, I think, got \$1,500.

5 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Eighteen hundred.

6 TREASURER LEWIS: Yeah, \$1800.

7 And then the Post got money back, and then the
8 company made money.

9 So please promote that. We were at a Post last
10 night and they actually didn't know anything about
11 it. So I was like, "Oh my." So we were talking
12 about that. So please promote that when you're
13 traveling through your Districts.

14 Any questions?

15 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Schmitt, Alternate NEC.

16 I assume about that Blake Farmer is still our
17 investment advisor.

18 TREASURER LEWIS: He is, yeah.

19 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Okay.

20 Blake's getting up there in years. Does he
21 have somebody in mind to replace him when he's out
22 the door?

23 TREASURER LEWIS: We'll find out next week.

24 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: He's done a fantastic
25 job for us.

1 TREASURER LEWIS: Yeah.

2 We will find out. So that's why I had asked JD
3 to invite him to our next meeting. Because I want
4 to know like what is he doing, who's taking over for
5 him, what's his succession plan look like, all the
6 things.

7 Suzette.

8 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Suzette Heller, 12th
9 District 1st Vice.

10 Do these partnerships require giving them our
11 membership database?

12 TREASURER LEWIS: They do not.

13 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Okay.

14 TREASURER LEWIS: No, they do not. They're
15 more of a marketing arrangement.

16 So like Nutrisippy wants to put our Ohio mark
17 on the bottle.

18 So National, last week, we met with National
19 about all of this to understand like what kind of
20 permission do we need from National to use the --
21 and we actually don't need permission from National
22 to use the Ohio mark.

23 So you know how we have the new mark that's
24 like The American Legion that looks like the flag,
25 right? Yeah, that one (indicating).

1 National actually did an Ohio-based one for us
2 last week and sent it to us. So we can use that on
3 the bottle.

4 We're also thinking about using a QR code that
5 would take them to ohiolegion.com/impact, so that
6 they would go right to the impact report, and then
7 possibly updating that page to have, "Join the
8 Auxiliary, join the SAL, join The Legion," so that
9 it's one place that we can funnel people through.

10 The other thing that's really, really
11 important, in the Media, Chris is probably going to
12 cover this in the Media report, we need to get
13 people to update their e-mail addresses. It is
14 very, very important for us, in these marketing
15 partnerships, to have a very large e-mail list.
16 That's what people are looking for. And our click
17 rates are great. Our open rates are great right
18 now. But we need more people on our list. So
19 please encourage people to go into MyLegion and
20 update their information.

21 Any other questions?

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

23 TREASURER LEWIS: Great, awesome. Thank you.

24 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Ron Distel, Department
25 Chaplain.

1 CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Morning, everyone.

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Morning.

3 CHAPLAIN DISTEL: It's good to see you all
4 again. I missed you in November. I thank you for
5 excusing me for that. And it was a necessary thing.
6 It was my 50th wedding anniversary.

7 (Applause).

8 Thank you.

9 And I was in a better place called "Hawaii."
10 But I appreciate all of you.

11 I've been made aware of a few comrades that are
12 having some difficulties.

13 Past Department Chaplain Al Buxton was in the
14 hospital, hospitalized with a heart condition. I
15 talked to him on the phone and I told him to get
16 back with me. And I'm not going to bother him while
17 he's in the hospital. He said he would. I haven't
18 heard from him yet.

19 And Jerry Wilson, he continues to recover from
20 his health problems that he encountered. Oh my
21 goodness, it's got to be four or five months now.
22 So keep him in your heart.

23 And Past Chaplain Jim Fast -- I think I'm
24 getting a rhythm here. And I'm Chaplain this year
25 and two Chaplains are in the hospital, okay. -- he

1 had an open heart surgery. So keep him in your
2 thoughts and prayers. He had some difficulties
3 afterwards and has been readmitted to the hospital.

4 And Past Department Commander Jean Wilson was
5 also in the hospital for some medical care.

6 I was informed by Thomas Tierney that Red Feltz
7 has been admitted to a nursing home.

8 And the other thing is Past Department
9 Commander Jason Rue unexpectedly lost his brother.

10 So keep all these folks in your prayers.

11 As always, if you know someone that needs
12 support, I need to know. I don't have a magic wand
13 and don't fly drones, so get ahold of me somehow. I
14 sure would appreciate it.

15 I've been sharing thoughts and prayers by snail
16 mail, e-mail. And I'm starting to prefer e-mail
17 because that snail mail is starting to cost quite a
18 bit. So if you can get an e-mail address, I'd
19 appreciate that also.

20 The summer convention is fast approaching. And
21 like last year, the Catholic Diocese cannot spare a
22 priest to come to the hotel. St. Michael's is about
23 three blocks from the hotel. They have a service at
24 4:30 in the afternoon, and they also have one at
25 7:30 in the morning.

1 We will have a nondenominational service in a
2 room upstairs at the hotel. I'll be placing flyers
3 around the hotel when we get there.

4 I'll close that I hope everyone stays healthy
5 and safe, because I don't want to include your name
6 in my report.

7 Mr. Commander.

8 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you, Chaplain Ron.
9 Thank you.

10 (Applause).

11 Next up is Al Beyer, Department Historian.

12 HISTORIAN BEYER: I'll keep it short today. I
13 promise.

14 (Applause).

15 And despite what some officer on the front
16 panel here says, I'm not going to tell any jokes
17 today.

18 No, all I've not to say is if you've got any
19 history books from your Posts in your Districts,
20 please bring them no later than the Department
21 Convention. After that, I can't accept them because
22 I've got to go through them and get them on to
23 National, if they qualify. All right, so Department
24 Convention, bring your history books.

25 That's all I got, Commander.

1 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

2 (Applause).

3 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Ron Chapman, NECman.

4 NEC CHAPMAN: Good morning.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

6 NEC CHAPMAN: Well, just a quick note to Ron on
7 his comment about snail mail, you know that I'm a
8 retired letter carrier. And our guest might have
9 something to say about that later because he also is
10 a retired Postal worker. I think it's darn pretty
11 cheap. You can send something from here to Alaska
12 for 60 cents. That's not too expensive compared to
13 a whole lot of things. Well, I have members in Utah
14 and Texas that I send things to. And, hey, 60
15 cents, that's pretty good.

16 Okay, we haven't had any meetings at the
17 National for a while. They're coming up next month.
18 So hopefully, when we get together before the
19 Department Convention, we'll have something.

20 So Al yielded me his time but I don't need a
21 whole bunch of your time. So what I'm going to do
22 is I'm going to introduce our guest.

23 Roger Mathison was elected as National Vice
24 Commander of The American Legion at the 105th
25 National Convention in New Orleans, Louisiana on

1 August 29th, 2024.

2 Commander Mathison is a Paid-Up-for-Life member
3 of the Coon Valley American Legion Post 116, in Coon
4 Valley, Wisconsin.

5 He earned his eligibility to join The American
6 Legion having served in the United States Army from
7 1971 to '73, as an EOD Specialist in the 88th
8 Ordinance Detachment.

9 He has held many positions at the Post, the
10 County, the District, and Department levels, and
11 several appointments at the National. He was a
12 two-time all-time high Post Commander. He also
13 served his County, his District, as a Commander.
14 And he's served his Department on several
15 committees, and currently is the Wisconsin American
16 Legion Baseball and Softball Commissioner, a
17 position that he has held since 2013. He has more
18 than 35 years of experience in The American Legion
19 Baseball as a player and a coach and as a
20 commissioner. He is a member of the National
21 Convention Commission since 2000.

22 He retired from the U.S. Postal Service in
23 2017, as a rural mail carrier, and is also a dairy
24 farmer. He still resides on his farm in Wisconsin.

25 He's been married to his wife Sandra, a retired

1 nurse, for 52 years. They have two children and
2 five grandchildren. Roger and Sandra enjoy sporting
3 events and being spectators at their grandchildren's
4 activities. They remain active in their local
5 community and the local organizations.

6 Please join me in welcoming and giving National
7 Vice Commander Roger Mathison a buckeye --

8 FROM THE FLOOR: Welcome.

9 NEC CHAPMAN: -- welcome.

10 (Applause).

11 NVC MATHISON: Thank you, Chappy.

12 Don't let the papers fool you there, I mean
13 scare you, because I've got a good memory but it's
14 awful short. So I've got to have some notes with
15 me.

16 Good morning, American Legion family.

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

18 NVC MATHISON: It's a real pleasure to be
19 amongst American Legion family members again. Thank
20 you for the invitation to join you this weekend.
21 The hospitality that you have shown me has been
22 fantastic.

23 Thank you, Commander, Mr. Adjutant.

24 Chappy, Alternate NEC, you've done a great job
25 making me feel welcome, and the many friends I've

1 had from Ohio over the years in serving on the
2 National Convention Commission.

3 This is my third time coming to the Columbus
4 area in the last few years. I've been here twice
5 before on the site visits when you were bidding for
6 National Convention. And every time I come back, I
7 see major improvements, positive improvements in
8 your area, and the positive impact that you make in
9 your community.

10 I bring you greetings from National Commander
11 James LaCoursiere, who's currently on his tour of
12 the states in the Northeast. And he wants to say,
13 also, thank you, thank you for the tremendous job
14 that the Ohio American Legion family does in
15 contributing to the programs and charities of The
16 American Legion.

17 I am amazed, at every convention we have at
18 National, Ohio gets up there and puts us all to
19 shame with their huge donations to The American
20 Legion charities. It is fantastic.

21 And I'm in envy of what you can do here at the
22 Department of Ohio. Our laws in Wisconsin don't
23 allow us to do the things that you do in your
24 gaming. But what you're doing with the gaming
25 income is very impressive. And I salute you for

1 that.

2 Commander LaCoursiere says that The American
3 Legion is the "Voice for veterans." And that's more
4 important now than ever. With the disasters that
5 we've had in our country, with the hurricanes, the
6 floods, the fires, and now with the chaos we have in
7 Washington, D.C., it's more imperative than ever
8 that The Legion stands up for our veteran families.

9 And I say "families" because it's not just the
10 veteran. It's the whole family that's involved and
11 made the sacrifice when we served.

12 We have to make sure that the Congress and the
13 president's administration is aware, fully aware, of
14 the needs of our servicemen and those who have
15 previously served. The medical, housing,
16 educational benefits, and the needs must be met.

17 So we've got to be vigilant. We've got to be
18 knowledgeable. And if need to be, we need to be
19 loud, to protect our veteran families. There's so
20 much we have to advocate for.

21 Less than one percent of our families in the
22 United States are involved with protecting our
23 country. So we have to keep reminding our
24 legislative leaders that the veterans honored our
25 commitment. So it's time for our country to honor

1 our veterans' commitment, commitment to our
2 veterans, especially at this time, when cuts to the
3 VA and the DOD are being discussed, and make sure
4 that services are not cut along with the personnel.

5 So I'd ask you all to please stay vigilant and
6 keep current by going to legion.org/action. And
7 that's our portal. So we can continue to see what
8 bills are important to our National office. And
9 with a simple click every morning, it takes less
10 than a minute, you can contact your Congressmen and
11 Senators on the support for the bills The American
12 Legion needs support on.

13 And it makes a difference. Because, remember,
14 at National Convention, then National Commander
15 Seehafer asked us all to contact our congressmen
16 about the Pact Act. And in one month, thousands and
17 thousands of e-mails and texts and phone calls made
18 a difference to get that Elizabeth Dole Act passed
19 in the lame-duck session of Congress, a major
20 improvement to the Pact Act, one that was needed,
21 especially for our caregivers. And The American
22 Legion made the difference again.

23 And now we must work for the Richard Star Act,
24 to eliminate the cutting of retirement pay for those
25 that are getting compensation. They earned their

1 retirement pay. They earned their compensation for
2 their injuries while they were in service. They
3 deserve to be paid the full amount, not be cut.

4 I just had spoke to a man when we were in D.C.
5 He said he just got 100 percent disability. He
6 said, unfortunately, he said his retirement pay got
7 cut about 70 percent. That's not fair.

8 The other thing we need to really focus on,
9 too, is also making sure our National Guard and
10 reserve unit personnel are fairly credited for their
11 service, whether state or national. They are
12 serving. They're on the front lines as much as
13 anybody else, and sometimes repeated deployments and
14 repeated call-ups at the state level. That service
15 should be compensated also, and educational
16 benefits, and admitted to the VA Hospital for care.
17 They raised their right hand, like everyone else, to
18 swear to protect our communities and our country.
19 They deserve to compensated fairly.

20 Our organization's commitment to our
21 communities is evident every day, especially, like I
22 said, with the national disasters we've had. The
23 NEF, the TFA, are coming in play more and more.

24 I just learned that the TFA, this past 12
25 months, has given out \$18 million dollars to

1 deserving families in need, for food assistance,
2 rent assistance, repairs for cars, and housing
3 repairs. Eighteen million dollars that you help
4 families stay whole. It makes a difference.

5 And our Americanism and Youth programs are
6 making a huge difference.

7 I still remember when Dan Seehafer was National
8 Commander. He gave a report to the NEC. They were
9 talking about that last night. I mean, he gets out,
10 and you remember how Past National Commander
11 Seehafer was, he's a pretty active speaker and his
12 hands were waiving and stuff like that, and he's
13 going "50 frickin' thousand members playing Legion
14 Baseball." He said, "That's an impact." But it is
15 making impact.

16 And I just talked to your Baseball Commissioner
17 just now. Now we started the softball in Wisconsin
18 a couple years ago. It's a demographic we hadn't
19 reached before. And I predict, in about ten years'
20 time, we're going to have more softball teams than
21 baseball teams.

22 But if you want to get something done, you get
23 a softball mother involved. Put her in charge. It
24 will get done.

25 But again, we're helping young people, and

1 giving them scholarship opportunities and teaching
2 them the importance of character, patriotism,
3 volunteerism, and the ability to work together as a
4 team. And that does make a huge difference.

5 I remember we hosted a round-robin weekend
6 tournament. And we had a team from Menomonie,
7 Wisconsin, which they were strong at the time. We
8 brought them down there. And between when we
9 weren't playing, I was up in the announcer's booth.

10 And the catcher from Menomonie was just a great
11 athlete, exceptional athlete. But, he was like a
12 half a bubble off, it seemed like, when he was
13 playing. Between innings he was dancing around, he
14 was joking around with the umpire, you know, his
15 catcher's helmet on top of his head.

16 And I talked to the coach afterwards. And I
17 said, "Boy, I just love your catcher. I mean I've
18 never seen an athlete do the things he did. But," I
19 said, "he seems a little strange, to be honest with
20 you."

21 And he said, "He's a great kid. But," he said,
22 "the only thing that's keeping this kid going is
23 baseball and sports in high school. Both his
24 parents are drug addicts. He seldom stays home. He
25 stays with me or his fellow teammates' families,

1 because he has no home life. The only thing keeping
2 this kid on the straight and narrow is American
3 Legion Baseball in the summer high school athletics
4 during the school year."

5 It made a difference to that young man. And I
6 can see that this man, given the proper guidance,
7 was going to be an outstanding individual, just the
8 way he carried himself, and to know that he was
9 carrying that burden of having both his parents drug
10 addicts but he's still out there performing at the
11 highest level. And you could just see his teammates
12 loved him. And you could see that. So we have to
13 work on making sure that these kids are loved also.

14 And we can't forget the work we've done as far
15 as scholarships. This organization gives out \$12
16 million in scholarships a year to deserving high
17 school students. Our problem is getting the kids to
18 apply for it. The money is there. Twelve million
19 dollars, that's making an impact.

20 And of course our service officers are making
21 one heck of a difference. In our last fiscal year,
22 \$21 billion, that our service officers, that were
23 trained and accredited by The American Legion, got
24 that compensation to our deserving veterans.

25 This is my 54th year of membership in The

1 American Legion. And I truly believe we are doing
2 more now than ever before.

3 And according to a Past National Commander, we
4 have stopped the slide in membership. Why? What
5 made a difference? What made the difference was the
6 "Buddy Check Program" and the "Be the One."

7 Right now we have 86,000 new members in The
8 American Legion, the last report I got. Eighty-six
9 thousand that saw the benefit to belonging to this
10 organization.

11 The "Be the One" program started under Past
12 National Commander Triola, continued under Past
13 National Commander Seehafer, continues this year
14 under Commander LaCoursiere, and is committed to
15 continue next year to the next National Commander.
16 "Be the one to save one." And it's a program that
17 has been copied by the VA now, and copied by other
18 organizations, because it works. As Commander
19 Seehafer says, "The American Legion changes lives
20 and saves lives." And this program definitely saves
21 lives.

22 The latest reports show that veterans' suicide
23 has decreased from about 22 a day down to 17.
24 That's still 17 too many. So at 17 suicides a day,
25 that comes to 6,205 suicides a year. But that

1 doesn't include the 280 active-duty service
2 personnel that committed suicide last year.

3 They say for every suicide, it's 130 people,
4 family members or friends, that are directly
5 affected by those that committed suicide. I
6 realized that myself because my brother-in-law
7 committed suicide on the year I had my Department
8 Convention when I was Department Commander.

9 But 130 people times these suicides, that comes
10 out to 843,000 people directly affected, every year,
11 by veteran suicide. That's a high priority for us,
12 to get that number down to zero.

13 And that's where the "Buddy Check" comes in.
14 That's so important. The National Commander asks
15 that we contact our members at least three times a
16 year, directly, a phone call, a knock at the door,
17 maybe just a text maybe once in a while, just to
18 make sure that they're still around and they know
19 that we're caring about them, just being a good
20 friend, a good neighbor. Let them know that they're
21 not forgotten, they're appreciated. And that's who
22 we are. We care for our fellow veterans.

23 I have a couple stories to tell you. One is a
24 success, one is a failure, a failure on my part.

25 A success story, or I guess you'd say a success

1 story: You know, Post 100, in Sparta, is right next
2 to Fort McCoy. And our current Department Vice
3 Commander, when he was a Post Commander, walked in
4 the bar one night at Post 100 and there's a
5 gentleman sitting at the end of the bar by himself,
6 very quietly nursing a beer, not talking to anyone.

7 So, Phil, being the membership hound that he
8 is, he said, "Ah-ha, we got a new member." He goes
9 down there, starts talking to him, buys him a beer.
10 Sitting and talking some more, buy another beer.
11 The whole night went that way. At the end of the
12 night they stood up smiling, shook hands and left,
13 each going their separate way.

14 The next night that gentleman came back into
15 the bar in Post 100, looking for Phil. He said, "I
16 just want to let you know," he said, "that you
17 changed me last night. You didn't know my plan for
18 the evening was to have one final beer, get in my
19 pickup, drive to Fort McCoy, at the edge to Fort
20 McCoy, in the woods, and commit suicide. I had a
21 pistol in my car, on the front seat of my pickup.
22 But, after having that time last night, I figured it
23 isn't as bad as I thought. I found another friend."

24 Not only did he stay alive, but he actually
25 joined Post 100, in Sparta. But again it was, "Be

1 the one to save one." What a difference.

2 Now I've got to tell you a failure on my part.

3 I was Post Adjutant for many years at my Post.

4 And being a small, rural community, we had the
5 creamery in town, you know. So it's the dairy
6 plant.

7 And we signed up the butter maker as a member.

8 And of course being the butter maker, he's working
9 nights. You never see him at a meeting. But every
10 first week or two in July, that membership check
11 came in every year without fail. Carl Glew paid his
12 membership every year. You didn't have to worry
13 about it.

14 So for several years, that check came in July,
15 not a problem. Until one year, it all of a sudden
16 got to be September and Carl's dues hadn't been paid
17 yet.

18 And knowing Carl, I figured, well, I lost the
19 damn check. So I kept on scrounging around every
20 folder I had, every briefcase I had, looked all over
21 the house, looked at the Legion Post. I couldn't
22 find no check for Carl.

23 So I had to swallow my pride. So I called
24 Carl's number.

25 His wife answered the phone. And I said, "I

1 apologize deeply." I said, "I screwed up." I said,
2 "I know Carl pays his dues every year in July. And
3 I, for some reason, I must have misplaced the check,
4 or thrown it out with the trash or whatever. I am
5 so sorry. Please call the bank and stop payment on
6 the check."

7 She didn't say much. And she finally gets back
8 on the line and just, "Carl died."

9 Then we found out, talking to her, he had been
10 in a nursing home for a couple years.

11 But because that membership check came in
12 without fail, I didn't take the time, then, to
13 contact him to see what he needed. At a time when
14 that husband and wife could have used our help, when
15 he was in a nursing home and he was in his final
16 days, we were not there. I failed. And that stuck
17 with me all the time. That's why the "Buddy Check"
18 is so important.

19 And I was a recipient of a "Buddy Check" call
20 back in September. I was getting ready to go on a
21 trip and Art Biesek, a retired District Chaplain,
22 called me. And he said, "Roger," he said, "I won't
23 see you at District Conference. I can't get out
24 right now. But would you mind me if I give you a
25 blessing over the phone for safety during your

1 travels?"

2 Boy, that made my day. For him, having medical
3 issues himself, on oxygen because he can't get out
4 of the house, but he's worried about me. He called
5 me up to give me a blessing over the phone. Boy,
6 that made a difference.

7 Now think of the difference you can make to
8 your fellow members and your neighbors. Give them a
9 call. Don't take him for granted.

10 And talking about for granted, I do see a
11 problem we have in The American Legion. I know we
12 do in Wisconsin. I'm sure we probably do all over
13 the country. Too many of our members and Posts take
14 for granted what The American Legion does.

15 How many in your Department never make it to a
16 County meeting, a District meeting, or a Department
17 meeting? Posts, some, they never show up. And
18 invariably these are the Posts that are always
19 calling, they're having problems, they're membership
20 is falling, they're not recruiting new members, and
21 they can't find anyone to take leadership positions.

22 I've been very fortunate that I had great
23 mentors when I first joined The American Legion.
24 When it was time for a District or County meeting,
25 they'd drag me along, you know. And they wanted to

1 make sure I was part of it. They made me feel like
2 I was important.

3 And our small Post, we'd have a couple cars go
4 to District every year. You know, a good car and a
5 bad car. One car stopped for coffee on the way home
6 and the other one stopped for something a little bit
7 stronger. But we wanted to make sure that we always
8 had good attendance. And we kind of lost that.

9 As mentors, as leaders, we've got to take these
10 members, that may not have a position in the Post,
11 and show them what The American Legion does at
12 District and County meetings, and Department
13 meetings.

14 I've been to every National Convention now
15 since '94, except for one. And what I learn at
16 these National Convention recharges my batteries
17 every year. I see what the National Legion does,
18 nationwide. And I go to Department levels and I see
19 what the Department activities are, and learn from
20 the other Posts. In fact, I learned this morning, I
21 bought a raffle ticket that had a thing I'm going to
22 try in my Post.

23 But I think the more we let our members know,
24 especially our newer members, our younger members,
25 our younger veterans, know what The Legion can do,

1 and be willing to adapt to what the new generation
2 of Legionnaires and veterans need. The guy with a
3 beer in each hand and a pack of cigarettes in both
4 pockets, telling dirty jokes, that isn't what the
5 newer families are looking for that. They're
6 looking for service, looking for family events.

7 I was talking to your Adjutant. The Department
8 of Ohio has done a great job in training. I heard
9 from your Adjutant of the good support and training
10 for your new Post Adjutants.

11 And that's what it comes down to, educating,
12 educating our members to what The American Legion
13 is, and what we could be doing more of.

14 Not every program of The American Legion fits
15 every community or every Post. They don't have the
16 capability. Maybe they don't have the need for
17 that. But they have a need for something else, that
18 maybe is not an official program, but adapt to it.

19 And we were talking before about maybe, in your
20 more urban communities, I heard last night talk
21 about 3-on-3 basketball, stuff like that. Soccer
22 teams, sponsor a soccer team or a small league in
23 your community that don't have baseball. Anything
24 to do to get your name out in the public, get your
25 foot in the door.

1 And I always look at it, especially, over the
2 years, I've worked through the youth. Because then
3 you go through the youth to get to the parents that
4 seems to work, you know. That makes a difference.

5 This last weekend, I attended the 50th
6 anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War, the
7 "National Vietnam War Veterans Day," in Onalaska,
8 Wisconsin, a great event. Being a Vietnam veteran
9 myself, a Vietnam Era veteran myself, I was very
10 honored to be invited to speak.

11 What impressed me most of that whole day was
12 that whole event was sponsored by businesses in the
13 local community and the Posts, but organized and run
14 by their younger Iraqi and Afghanistan veterans in
15 our District. They did a fantastic job. For these
16 young veterans, that weren't even born yet on
17 Vietnam, to honor us, it was great. So I really,
18 really commend these young leaders taking it upon
19 themselves to do that.

20 You know, our World War II veterans and Korean
21 veterans built our communities. Now I think it's
22 our turn to bind our communities. With what's going
23 on right now in our political atmosphere in our
24 country, we need to come together again. Come
25 together as Americans, trying to drop the "D" and

1 "R," democrats and republicans. Time to become
2 Americans again, striving for the common good.

3 We have to learn to show our leaders we can
4 lead with civility, compassion, and a sense of
5 cooperation. And we should demand that our elected
6 legislative leaders do the same. Enough with the
7 name calling, enough with the finger pointing. Get
8 down, do your job, work for your constituents. Make
9 sure you're working for the constituents, not for
10 the political parties. Because we don't want to be
11 just pawns of the parties. We want to be Americans
12 working for our communities for the good of us all.

13 This year is the centennial for American Legion
14 Baseball. So I know communities all around the
15 country are going to be celebrating. And you see
16 that in the Facebook pages of The American Legion.
17 Every day there's a different Department that's
18 being honored.

19 Next year is the 250 anniversary, or birthday,
20 of our country. I hope our Legion Posts are in the
21 forefront of every community, leading that large of
22 celebrating 250 years of America being a country and
23 who we are as Americans.

24 I always throw out a challenge, too.

25 I was impressed today, when we had the

1 preamble, reciting of the preamble, how strong you
2 all did that. It was impressive.

3 But I challenge a lot of the Posts. Because a
4 lot of the Posts, they just ramble through it. They
5 don't really pay attention. I challenge the Posts
6 to pick one person in your membership with a good,
7 strong voice, a clear voice. And at one meeting,
8 have that person recite the preamble, and everyone
9 else just sit and listen. Because that preamble
10 says what we are as The American Legion. We have to
11 take that to heart. I think sometimes we forget
12 what it is.

13 So I thank you for allowing me the opportunity
14 to speak today, and probably bore you. But I really
15 enjoyed my visit here. I thank you for the
16 invitation.

17 I always end with a poem that was written, I
18 was touring the VA Hospital in Marion, Illinois, and
19 it's a poem written by one of the patients there who
20 became a long-term resident of their long-term care
21 facility. He wanted to remain anonymous. But he
22 penned this poem that they actually put on a big
23 banner on a chair. And it fits perfectly with our
24 POW/MIA observance, and also the "Buddy Check" and
25 "Be the One" Program. And it's called, "The Empty

1 Chair."

2 "I wonder how we would react if at all our
3 meetings there was an empty chair. Would we look
4 away or possibly turn and stare?

5 "But why would we bother with an empty chair,
6 if all it does is elicit a stare? Can an empty
7 chair speak or convey thought? Or is it just empty
8 and thus should never have been brought?

9 "But what if the chair was an unspoken vet?
10 Could we ignore its presence without feeling regret?

11 "It's a powerful thing, the empty chair. It
12 doesn't have to speak, but we know it's there. As
13 the chair can't speak, it has no voice, but to rely
14 on us to become its voice."

15 So let's be the voice for that empty chair, be
16 the voice for all veterans in America.

17 And may God bless America. And thank you very
18 much for listening to me today. Thank you.

19 (Applause).

20 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you, sir.

21 Next up is Robert Schmitt, Alternate NEC.

22 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Commander, as Alternate
23 NEC, I am still in training. And when I graduate up
24 to, hopefully, Chappy's spot, I will have learned to
25 keep my mouth shut and listen. And by then I will

1 have a chance to speak.

2 (Applause).

3 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

4 Josh Brown, our Department Judge Advocate.

5 JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Morning.

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Morning.

7 JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: The Department has asked
8 me to do a handful of smaller consultations on just
9 some issues that have come up. So I've been doing
10 that.

11 We have two ongoing lawsuits right now. Both
12 of them I consider utterly frivolous, and so I'm
13 treating them as such and keeping JD informed on
14 that. So, hopefully, within a few months, we'll be
15 out of both of those lawsuits.

16 So that's what we have going on.

17 And as always, I will give you my personal
18 number, in case you need anything from me:

19 614-284-4394, 614-284-4394.

20 And I'm also, I've talked to JD, I'm looking at
21 maybe doing a seminar this summer. And I'm thinking
22 that I might do the seminar on handling money, how
23 to handle money that comes in and money that you
24 need to move around, money that needs to be set
25 aside. So I'm thinking about hosting that in my

1 office this summer.

2 If you have anything else that you would like
3 me maybe to do a legal seminar on this summer,
4 please approach me.

5 And we're still working on what the subject
6 will be, but I think that will be kind of the gist
7 of it. But I would love to talk to you about
8 evolving that into something that can be very
9 helpful.

10 So thank you.

11 (Applause).

12 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

13 Gary Minadeo, Department Parliamentarian.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Since Al didn't talk
15 much, could I have some of his time too?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: No.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: See how it goes here
18 in Ohio?

19 Since November of 2024, when we consolidated
20 all these CBLs, constitution and bylaw reviews,
21 under the Parliamentarian, I've done 162 reviews.
22 Okay? I finished four more last night: Post 16,
23 446, 96, 217. On the list is still: 738, 323, 225,
24 211, 114, 266, 382, and District 14.

25 Now what happens is, people have learned. They

1 started sending them to me directly. And I just
2 send them down to Kathleen, the executive assistant,
3 and they get on the list. You go right to the
4 bottom of the list.

5 It takes me two or three weeks to get around to
6 these when I'm in school teaching. Okay? But April
7 18th through the 25th, I have my Easter vacation.
8 I've got a little more time.

9 If you've got folks that need their bylaws
10 approved, have them get them to the Department then,
11 and then I can jam on those. Okay?

12 We're doing better. They're coming in "In all
13 wars." They've gotten the message to put "All wars"
14 in the preamble.

15 One thing, under auxiliaries, our Legions that
16 have Riders where the Riders believe they're not an
17 auxiliary. Well, they are. Some few years ago, in
18 the Constitution of the Department of Ohio, they are
19 listed under auxiliaries. So you have the Auxiliary
20 auxiliary, The Legion Auxiliary, then you have the
21 SAL, Sons of The American Legion, which is
22 considered an auxiliary, and now the Riders is
23 considered an auxiliary.

24 So all they have to do is go to that section,
25 typically it's Article VII in the bylaws, and under

1 "Auxiliaries," just take what you did for the Legion
2 Auxiliary and just put the Riders in there and
3 recognize them as much.

4 Quorums. Okay, I'm looking at the quorums.
5 It's hard to explain the quorums. But you, when you
6 go do your inspection, please understand, we have a
7 lot of people spending a lot of money and there's no
8 quorum. Legally, if someone doesn't like that, they
9 could sue the Post because your bylaws say you're
10 supposed to have a quorum to make official decisions
11 under new business, especially spending money.

12 Now, one of the things they could do is, if
13 your Post has a finance meeting where you look at
14 the costs for the year and you actually work out a
15 budget, not likes Congress but an actual budget, and
16 you sit there and say here is the common things we
17 pay, we pay the electricity and such like that, if
18 you approve those up front, within a certain limit,
19 then you could go ahead and pay those bills.

20 But other things, like donations and such, you
21 need to be careful with that. So they need to work
22 on calling people, giving out an extra drink, food,
23 I don't know what it is.

24 I mean my Post has trouble too. And what I've
25 been doing is, once we have our meeting, I post, not

1 all the minutes, I just take here's the new business
2 that was discussed, we had this many at the meeting,
3 I need three more votes in favor. And if I get
4 those three votes in favor, then I write that down
5 as we had approval to move that. But you've got to
6 get quorums.

7 The other thing about quorum that I've seen in
8 a couple already, and I tell them about, if their
9 executive committee has six people on it, and the
10 quorum for their Post meeting is four, not that it
11 happens in The American Legion, not in Ohio, I'm
12 sure it happens in other places, like Michigan, but
13 the executive committee theoretically could vote to
14 empty all checking accounts equally to each of the
15 executive committee, approve it in the executive
16 committee, don't tell anybody about it, go to the
17 normal meeting, where there's just four of them
18 there and no one else, and go ahead and ratify
19 emptying the checking account. Now I haven't seen
20 that done, but it can be done. And there's people
21 that get close to doing that.

22 So you ought to have at least two other people.
23 If your quorum, if the executive committee has eight
24 people, your quorum should be ten, and get two other
25 people there to say, hey, wait a minute, what's

1 going on with this. Someone that could put some
2 logic to it.

3 So take a look at the quorums when you do your
4 inspections.

5 And then finally, we still have issues with the
6 discipline paragraph in the constitution and bylaws.
7 Some people talk about discipline in the
8 constitution and in their bylaws. It doesn't need
9 to be in both. It can be in your bylaws. That's
10 where it is for the Department.

11 And they're still putting in there that the
12 executive committee has all authority on
13 suspensions. That's not true anymore. You now have
14 to go by the Department Constitution and Bylaws,
15 which talk about the disciplinary procedure. It's
16 in Article V of the Department Bylaws, Section II.

17 All they need to do is, any officer or member
18 that will be suspended or expelled, or removed from
19 office, must be shown cause per the Department of
20 Ohio Bylaws, Article V, Section II. If they want to
21 write all the discipline procedures in there, they
22 can. But they just need to reference that and have
23 the discipline procedures on task.

24 When you get into that trick bag of wanting to
25 expel somebody or remove them from office or suspend

1 them from The American Legion, which means they are
2 not allowed to come to your meetings and vote, okay,
3 you can suspend them from your canteen but you
4 cannot remove their right to come to a meeting
5 unless you've shown cause for that, the person to
6 call for that is the lawyer, if you need advice.
7 All right? Because this gets real sticky now
8 because we've got these procedures.

9 So I understand the guy is being a problem or
10 the girl is being a problem. It's causing issues in
11 our meetings. Sit them down. Talk to them. Okay?

12 I recommend you put them on a 90-day probation.
13 You could still come to the meetings, you have all
14 your rights, but you need to calm down.

15 Work with them one on one. Just like a
16 Commander's inquiry would do, you know, you pick one
17 of the Second Lieutenants, say, "Go do this and talk
18 to this guy or else I'm going to jam them up." All
19 right? So you need to just work on that.

20 But the bylaws need to be clear. Because if
21 you're going by old procedures, you're going to be
22 in trouble. You're going to be in trouble.

23 But I enjoy doing it. Send them to me. I have
24 no problem answering questions on the fly. I can
25 give you my phone number and e-mail but it seems you

1 all have it anyways. So if you need some help,
2 fine.

3 The last thing is, if a Post changed their
4 bylaws, had the meeting, had the quorum, and then
5 they approved it without us approving it, okay, it's
6 not the end of the world, just send it down to us,
7 we can take a look.

8 And normally my corrections are change this to
9 this by direction of the Department. Okay? It does
10 not need to be voted on at this point because it
11 favors the body.

12 Like when you're doing an amendment, you should
13 have the same amendment paragraph for the
14 constitution and bylaws.

15 Some people think you can change the bylaws
16 just (snapping fingers) in Post meeting. Hey, could
17 we change this? Okay. And then we go vote on it.

18 No. You have to do the notification.

19 We're asking that the notification be 35, a
20 minimum of 35 days prior to the final note and
21 discussion on the amendment. All right?

22 Why? Even though we're paying 73 cents, not 60
23 cents, to mail out a letter, sometimes it doesn't
24 get there, they don't read it, they throw it out.
25 So you want to get a lot of good discussion. You

1 want to discuss with -- and that's a way of getting
2 people involved. Hey, we actually meet and talk
3 about how we run this place. So come and discuss
4 with us that.

5 So I just say change it to 35 days.

6 How can we change that without a vote? Because
7 I've had that pushback. How are you the
8 Parliamentarian but we don't need to have a vote on
9 this? Because going from ten days to 35 days, it
10 obeys the chosen, precious rule of Robert's Rules of
11 Order, it moves in favor of the body having more of
12 a voice than less of a voice. So it's assumed that
13 the body will want to have that. So you can write
14 that in until your next meeting. Okay?

15 So when I say that, you'll see "Approved with
16 comment." Just go ahead and make that pen and ink
17 change. And you don't have to have everybody come
18 back and vote on it. You should let them know,
19 here's what happened, that the Parliamentarian,
20 whose name is everything but Gary sometimes, said we
21 need to do this. And it's fine, you could do that.
22 All right?

23 So let's just get them done. We're doing well.
24 I don't know what the statistic is on getting some
25 of these updated because we're going through the

1 ones we know and saying, hey, it's been, you know,
2 35 years, maybe you want to look at your
3 constitution and bylaws.

4 Lastly, elections coming up. Districts ought
5 to be telling the Posts, when you have those new
6 officers, then the first meeting after their
7 initiated is to sit down with your constitution and
8 bylaws and read it. Just read it through so you
9 know what's happening in your Post. Okay?

10 Any questions for me, ladies and gentlemen?

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Thank you. Bless
13 you. Thanks for putting up with the length. I
14 appreciate it.

15 Commander, God bless you.

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: They don't clap for you.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: No, they don't clap
18 for me.

19 (Applause).

20 That was really good.

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: JD Robinson, Department
22 Adjutant, is up next.

23 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Good morning again. Thank
24 you all for coming out. It's wonderful seeing all
25 of these wonderful faces.

1 One little area I want to touch real quick is
2 we do have our Adjutant's Association meetings
3 monthly. If you want to be on the list, let me
4 know. If your District Adjutant is not attending
5 them, I highly suggest they should, and your Post
6 Adjutants.

7 We're getting attendance anywhere from 30 to
8 50, is the attendance I've been getting monthly. So
9 I'm taking that as a win. That's roughly ten
10 percent of the Posts we have.

11 But if your Adjutant need information, please
12 have them reach out. It is a really great
13 discussion. It's a laid back meeting and we cover a
14 lot of really good topics. And just watching the
15 Posts work from Post to Post, hey, my Post is going
16 through that right now, this is what I found out,
17 and sharing that information with somebody else,
18 it's a game changer. It's making people's lives a
19 lot easier.

20 I don't see everything that happens at a Post
21 level. I'm not going through that at my Post. So I
22 have all those answers. I can find them, but I
23 don't always have them right at my fingertips.

24 So please encourage your Posts and your
25 District Adjutants to get on the meeting with us.

1 To the Department staff, thank you all for the
2 hard work this week getting this meeting ready. I
3 know we put a lot of time and effort in, so thank
4 you guys.

5 (Applause).

6 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Suzette Heller, 12th
7 District 1st Vice.

8 What day, specifically? Are those recurring on
9 the same day every time?

10 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: No. It changes from month
11 to month so more people can attend them.

12 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Okay.

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: We're now under our
14 commission reports.

15 Before we go into that, I'm going to give you
16 my percentage, Commander's percentage, for
17 membership that we did at the last membership
18 meeting for the Department of Ohio. It's 61.60
19 (sic) percent -- 96, I'm sorry, 96.

20 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: No, 91.6.

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Ninety-one-point-six
22 percent.

23 Right now we're right around 90 percent.

24 So, up next, Membership Chair Stan Oren, 1st
25 Vice Commander.

1 1VC OREN: And I'm back again.

2 Well, I have a couple of awards to give out.
3 I'd like to get them done and then we'll continue
4 on.

5 Okay, large category, the fighting 5th
6 District. Would you please come forward, Bob?

7 We'll have you stay there so Al can get
8 pictures.

9 The great 1st District, Mark Mahlman.

10 (Applause).

11 And small category, treacherous 13th District,
12 Commander Robert (sic) Wright.

13 FROM THE FLOOR: Tenacious.

14 1VC OREN: Tenacious.

15 (Applause).

16 Al is going to come up and get your mug shots.

17 TREASURER LEWIS: What is this award for?
18 Stan, what is this award for?

19 1VC OREN: This is the Big "1." I'm sorry.
20 That's in bold print at the top of the page.

21 (Applause).

22 Thank you guys.

23 Next, the lantern exchange. I got that done.

24 Okay, the green lantern, the 12th District
25 needs to come up and pass it to the 10th District.

1 (Applause).

2 And the red lantern unfortunately stays with
3 the 14th.

4 I challenge the 14th --

5 FROM THE FLOOR: I believe it's the 4th
6 District.

7 1VC OREN: The 4th. Geez, send me back to
8 school.

9 Okay, to the 4th District, you're only about
10 two percent out. Push it over on somebody else.
11 Give it away.

12 Now, the next thing, I've got to go back.
13 Michigan is still in seventh. We're in fourteenth.
14 I'm going to harp on this until --

15 2VC COX, JR.: Please do.

16 1VC OREN: We need your help on membership.
17 But we are doing pretty good. We're at 91.6, is it?

18 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: That's what we're striving
19 to. We're at 89 right now.

20 1VC OREN: Okay, 89.92.

21 With that being said, I need all the help we
22 can get.

23 And thank you.

24 (Applause).

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Gary Cox, Jr., 2nd Vice

1 Commander, Post activities.

2 2VC COX, JR.: Good morning again.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

4 2VC COX, JR.: Well, so far, all we've gotten
5 done, we've had the bowling tournament. And I do
6 not believe we have any bids for this upcoming year
7 of 2026 for the bowling.

8 FROM THE FLOOR: We're working on it.

9 2VC COX, JR.: I know we've some feelers out
10 there for it. But, please, it is a great event.
11 There's not a lot of work that you have to do to get
12 it going. But it's a big thing when it comes to the
13 Department. It's one of our biggest tournaments.

14 We have, upcoming, we have the Department Pool
15 Tournament. And that's in the 11th District, at
16 Post 29. And that is April 11th through the 13th.

17 Now the way it's broken down to is the 11th is
18 actually an open tournament. Anyone can shoot pool.
19 Saturday is the singles event for members only. And
20 Sunday is the doubles event for members only.

21 Also that same weekend, which is this upcoming
22 weekend, is the Department Cornhole Tournament,
23 which is in Massillon, which I believe Larry's Post
24 is holding that one, Larry Stottsberry, who is
25 actually here. So make sure you get with him in

1 case you guys want to do that. It's a great event.

2 Then in May we have the Department Euchre
3 Tournament.

4 And of course, after our convention is over, we
5 have our golf tournament. And it's Joe Law that's
6 running that one.

7 And then we have the trap shoot tournament
8 later on in September.

9 Those are the events that we have coming up.
10 Please participate. If you don't want to
11 participate, at least go and participate that way in
12 supporting it, because that's what we need to do.

13 Thank you for your time.

14 So on March 23rd --

15 I'll wait.

16 So on March 23rd, we had the Post Activities
17 and Membership Meeting. And we went over many --
18 well, actually, the main thing we went over is the
19 upcoming '25-'26 Awards Manual. So I need a motion
20 to accept.

21 There were changes. Did everybody get the
22 e-mail on the changes? Because I know that was
23 brought up, that we would have that.

24 So we need a motion to accept the, correct? So
25 we would entertain the motion.

1 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: And I believe there's a
2 resolution to change the name of the Brad Teis
3 Award.

4 2VC COX, JR.: Yes.

5 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It's not been set out. So
6 it would be presented at this meeting.

7 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: You have a motion on
8 the floor.

9 2VC COX, JR.: I haven't made a motion yet, or
10 entertained a motion. So there isn't a motion yet.

11 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: No, there's not a motion.

12 2VC COX, JR.: Okay.

13 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: The Commander has to ask
14 for the motion.

15 COMMANDER WHATLEY: I need a motion on the
16 floor on the activities.

17 10TH DISTRICT CMDR MAROTTO: Howard Marotto,
18 10th District. I'd like to make the motion on the
19 activities.

20 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: Dean Boyers from the
21 1st District seconds that motion.

22 COMMANDER WHATLEY: A motion has been properly
23 made and seconded.

24 Any discussion?

25 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yes. Suzette

1 Heller, 12th District 1st Vice.

2 I would like to present a resolution on that
3 manual, to change the Brad Teis Award to make that
4 the Buckeye Membership Award in that manual. So --

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: You can have it one
6 of two ways.

7 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah.

8 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: You can make it a
9 set-aside from the minutes or have an amendment to
10 the minutes. I would recommend just make it a
11 set-aside.

12 COMMANDER WHATLEY: We'll do that, set aside
13 your resolution.

14 Any other discussion?

15 NEC CHAPMAN: Chapman, NEC.

16 I think it would be a good idea to read those
17 changes, just to refresh everyone's mind here, since
18 we don't have an actual booklet in front of us that
19 shows us those changes.

20 We know that, you know, we know that the
21 categories change with the Posts from year to year.
22 We know that's common. But it's just the actual
23 changes in the awards, we need to hear those.

24 2VC COX, JR.: One of the changes was the Post
25 Activity Award. So the discussion on the criteria

1 for the Post Activity Award was more specific, to
2 avoid miscommunication and ensure clarity for the
3 applicants. It was changing to give \$100 for Posts
4 that completed at least three activities over the
5 calendar year. And they can do as many as 12,
6 giving them a total of \$300 over the course of the
7 year. The motion to accept that change was through
8 John Life.

9 And of course the changing of the Brad Teis
10 Award to the Buckeye Membership Award was also on
11 there. It was just discussed in a resolution.

12 I think that was about it.

13 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: That was pretty much the
14 only major changes.

15 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Did you approve the
16 name change?

17 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: They approved the name
18 change in there, but it was created by a resolution.
19 So it takes a resolution to change the name of it.

20 2VC COX, JR.: Correct.

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: And this did go
22 through IA and Finance?

23 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.

24 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any other questions?

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1 Any other questions?

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

3 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, all for it by
4 saying aye.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

6 COMMANDER WHATLEY: All against by saying no.

7 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

8 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carries.

9 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Suzette Heller, 12th
10 District 1st Vice. I'm presenting this resolution
11 to change the membership award.

12 So this would be presented, the origin of this
13 would be from this Department Executive Committee.

14 Do you want me to just read the resolve clause
15 or the whole entire thing?

16 FROM THE FLOOR: Read the whole thing.

17 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Read the whole
18 thing, okay.

19 "Whereas, The American Legion Department of
20 Ohio Department Executive Committee passed
21 Resolution 23-02 on December 3rd, 2022, to create a
22 new membership award in the name of deceased Past
23 Department Commander Bradley A. Teis, Sr., from the
24 10th District; and

25 "Whereas, the Bradley A. Teis, Sr., Race to the

1 Top Membership Award is part of the annual
2 Department Membership Awards Manual since 2023, with
3 no recipients; and

4 "Whereas, the membership award is available and
5 encouraged to all Districts within The American
6 Legion Department of Ohio; now, therefore, be it

7 "Resolved, by The American Legion Department of
8 Ohio Department Executive Committee, assembled at
9 Department Headquarters on April 5th, 2025, that The
10 American Legion Department of Ohio change the
11 'Bradley A. Teis, Sr., Award' to the 'Buckeye
12 Membership Award' within The American Legion
13 Department of Ohio Membership Awards Manual; and, be
14 it further

15 "Resolved, that The American Legion Department
16 of Ohio keep the spirit and criteria of this
17 membership award, which is the first District to
18 achieve quota before the last day of March will
19 qualify for the National American Legion Race to the
20 Top Award and the quota District will receive
21 \$2,500, and a plaque recognizing their achievement;
22 and, be it finally

23 ""Resolved, that The American Legion Department
24 of Ohio 2026 Membership Awards Manual reflect these
25 changes."

1 COMMANDER WHATLEY: I need a motion to accept
2 the membership resolution.

3 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
4 District, makes a motion to accept as read.

5 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: I'll second that
6 motion.

7 COMMANDER WHATLEY: The motion has been
8 properly made and seconded.

9 Discussion?

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

11 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any discussion?

12 10TH DISTRICT CMDR MAROTTO: Howard Marotto,
13 10th District, Department of Ohio.

14 What was the need to change it from the Brad
15 Teis Award?

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: I think there was something
17 in your resolution that mentioned that.

18 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: The "Whereas" is
19 that it's open to all Districts. So the discussion
20 in the M&PA Committee was that it was available to
21 all the Districts. And so they didn't want to just
22 name it after one Department Commander. They just
23 wanted it to be more inclusive of having it
24 statewide. And so they just wanted to name it the
25 "Buckeye Membership Award." So that was the

1 discussion in the M&PA Committee.

2 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any other discussion?

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

4 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, all for it by
5 saying aye.

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Aye).

7 COMMANDER WHATLEY: All against have the same
8 right by saying no.

9 FROM THE FLOOR: No.

10 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carries.

11 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: So the acceptance of
12 this rescinds this 23-02 resolution naturally.

13 Thank you.

14 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

15 Next up is Christie White. She has
16 Americanism, Athletic Committee, Oratorical,
17 Children and Youth.

18 COORDINATOR WHITE: I will be quick, I promise.
19 Time me.

20 Start the timer, Ken.

21 Okay, the Americanism Commission met on March
22 22, at 10:00 AM, Zoom. Chairman Rowe opened the
23 meeting. The previous minutes were read. They were
24 moved and seconded.

25 The A&G trip, we did a recap on it. I let the

1 commission know that it was the best group of
2 students that we have ever taken on the trip, ever.
3 They wanted to see and read everything, they
4 listened well, and they were just great young
5 leaders.

6 Make sure, if you have young leaders from your
7 Districts, go give them a pat on the back, because
8 they were awesome.

9 Eagle Scout of the Year was discussed. The
10 commission discussed both applicants and they
11 thought both had amazing Eagle Scout projects. The
12 commission was leaning towards one because he is a
13 senior and the other is a sophomore and still has
14 chances to apply. They are encouraging the
15 sophomore to apply next year.

16 It was motioned and seconded to accept Vaughan
17 Zimmerman as the Department Eagle Scout of the Year.

18 The Educator of the Year Award packet was
19 discussed. It was edited and you all should have a
20 copy of it in your packet.

21 A&G Procedures were discussed. Discussion was
22 had about if the commission wants to accept all
23 tests scores, regardless of the scores from every
24 District, so they are represented, or if the
25 commission wants to set a cut-off score.

1 Discussion was had that the Districts should
2 set their score level, not Department.

3 The commission was encouraged to send their
4 District minutes to Department if they vote on only
5 accepting a certain percentage for A&G Tests.
6 Commission chairs were directed to discuss and
7 address this at their District Conferences.

8 Discussion was had about Districts being in
9 contact with their District winners and letting them
10 know when Department is judging and keep them up to
11 date so they get their paperwork turned in on time.

12 The commission still has an issue with getting
13 the winning District tests to Department on time.
14 Discussion was had about sending all District
15 winners with a tracking number to Department so the
16 tests can be tracked.

17 The commission was encouraged to stay in
18 constant contact with the Posts in their Districts
19 that are giving tests to make sure they reach each
20 level before the due date.

21 There was an e-mail sent to Department by a
22 parent of a 11th grade female that had 100% on her
23 test. The parent insists that their daughter be
24 sent as a winner next year because she scored 100
25 this year but her test never made it to the District

1 level. The commission discussed that deadlines are
2 deadlines for a reason. It was suggested that the
3 District do something one on one with the school for
4 the student, and that the student re-test next year.

5 There was a motion and second to disregard the
6 test because the school should not have graded the
7 test and the test was not received by the next level
8 by the requested deadline.

9 Districts are encouraged to reach out to their
10 young leaders that attended the trip this year and
11 let them know that they made their Districts proud.

12 And the meeting adjourned at 11:33.

13 TREASURER LEWIS: I have a question. Holly
14 Lewis, Treasurer.

15 How many of the kids that were qualified to go
16 on the trip chose not to?

17 COORDINATOR WHITE: I'd have to give you that
18 number. I want to say five.

19 TREASURER LEWIS: Okay. And how many actually
20 went on the trip?

21 COORDINATOR WHITE: All 18.

22 TREASURER LEWIS: Okay. But there were five
23 that got high scores that decided not to go?

24 COORDINATOR WHITE: Correct.

25 TREASURER LEWIS: Because I would like to know

1 if that's a trend.

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: So it varies year by year.
3 Some of it has to do with sports. Some of it has to
4 do science olympiads that they already have on the
5 schedule.

6 TREASURER LEWIS: Sure, sure.

7 COORDINATOR WHITE: I have most of the reasons
8 written down that I can get you.

9 TREASURER LEWIS: Okay.

10 COORDINATOR WHITE: It's not just because they
11 just don't want to. It's because there's something
12 else conflicting that's on their schedule.

13 Do I need a motion for that, those minutes, or
14 no?

15 COMMANDER WHATLEY: No.

16 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: Mason, 5th District
17 Commander. I have a question. Maybe this isn't the
18 proper time for it.

19 I've been informed that the Department, and I'm
20 not sure if I even know this for a fact, that the
21 Department does not recognize the Eagle Scout of the
22 Year by any award or anything, that it just gets
23 passed on to National.

24 We do the Americanism and stuff that we're
25 supposed to do. You know, we do the things for our

1 kids. To me, Eagle Scout of the Year is a big thing
2 and they should be recognized as such.

3 So I just question, if we don't, why don't we?

4 COORDINATOR WHITE: So I will say that we
5 recently had discussion about that. Americanism was
6 talking about potentially creating a resolution for
7 that. However, we have to figure out, one, are we
8 going to award them at Mid-Winter, and, two, where
9 is the money coming from for the award, and for
10 banquet and hotel if we're going to do that as well.

11 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: So the answer is: As
12 of now, we do not.

13 COORDINATOR WHITE: Correct. But it is in the
14 works.

15 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any other questions?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WHATLEY: You may proceed.

18 COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay.

19 The Athletic Committee met on February 23rd, at
20 10:00 AM, here at Department Headquarters.

21 It was moved and seconded to accept the minutes
22 from the previous Athletic Committee meeting.

23 The 2025 Ohio Rulebook was reviewed.

24 Junior and Senior Tournament dates: The Junior
25 Baseball Tournament is July 17th through the 20th,

1 which is Thursday through Sunday. Senior Tournament
2 dates are July 25th through 28th, which is Friday
3 through Monday.

4 The Junior State Tournament will be just like
5 the Senior State Tournament. The teams will be
6 staying at hotels. Jeff Vrabel, Jr., who will be
7 the SAL Commander, will throw out the first pitch.
8 Thursday games are at 10:30, 1:00, 3:30, and 6:00.
9 Friday games are at 9:00, 11:30, 2:00, and 4:30.
10 Saturday games are 9:00, 11:30, and 2:00. Sunday
11 games are 10:00 o'clock, and, if necessary, games
12 will be 30 minutes after the end of the first.

13 Team Fees. The Junior fees are \$500. Senior
14 fees are \$600.

15 The Regional Tournament Dates are August 6th
16 through the 10th.

17 Background Check and Abuse Awareness Training,
18 everyone that is involved in Legion Baseball has to
19 do this. If you have questions, talk to me or talk
20 to Chris Emmons.

21 National Updates, there are none at this time.

22 Super Regional locations, Junior: Region 1 is
23 doing best of three, one game at North Baltimore;
24 one game at Bettsville; and the third game field
25 selection based on runs. Region 2, east and west,

1 three-team brackets, East vs West Tournament, June
2 30th, at Sidney High School. Region 3, July 10th
3 through the 13th at the Chillicothe VA Stadium.
4 Region 4 is July 9th through the 13th, at Fort Fry.

5 Super Regional Locations for the Senior
6 Tournament: Region 1, July 16th through the 19th,
7 at Findlay High School. Region 2, July 13th through
8 18th, at Bellefontaine High School. Region 3, July
9 16th through 20th, at Chillicothe VA Stadium.
10 Region 4 is July 16th through the 20th, at
11 St. Clairsville.

12 It's all in the minutes. So nobody freak out
13 and write fast.

14 It is encouraged that all regions receive
15 proclamations from their city mayor, local
16 government, just because it is the Legion Baseball
17 100th Anniversary.

18 "Community Fun Day" we plan on doing again at
19 the baseball field. It was a lot of fun. There was
20 a lot of people that came out.

21 We're asking each Region Director to contact
22 former MLB players and/or compile a list so we can
23 send them an invite, that previously played Legion
24 Baseball. Community Fun Day should start around
25 10:00 AM this year.

1 We have bat raffle tickets, which, if I was
2 smart enough, I would have grabbed them off my desk.
3 Each team that makes it to the six-team bracket will
4 receive a bat for the 100th anniversary. The two
5 leftover bats will be raffled. Tickets are \$5 each
6 or 5 for 20. The drawing will be between 5:00 and
7 7:30 on Friday of the Senior State Tournament game.

8 There's new 100-year baseball patches that are
9 available on National's website. And 100th-year
10 anniversary pins were discussed.

11 It was motioned and seconded for Department to
12 purchase 500 pins. And Department can purchase an
13 additional 500 pins if the originals are all sold.

14 The meeting was adjourned until 11:34, when the
15 coaches and managers meeting started.

16 The Junior Tournament Bracket was picked.
17 Instead of me reading all of those, you should have
18 gotten copies of the Junior and Senior Tournament
19 Brackets.

20 There is now no home or visitor on the bracket.
21 Teams will flip for everything at the tournament.

22 Donation gate fees were discussed also. We
23 will add people at the gate for donations when they
24 walk in.

25 And the meeting adjourned at 1:42.

1 COMMANDER WHATLEY: This requires a motion.

2 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd
3 District Commander, so moves to approve.

4 NEC CHAPMAN: Chapman, NEC, seconds.

5 COMMANDER WHATLEY: A motion has been properly
6 made and seconded.

7 Any discussion?

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

9 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any discussion?

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

11 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, all vote for
12 it by saying aye.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

14 COMMANDER WHATLEY: All against, no.

15 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carries.

17 COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay, a quick recap on
18 Oratorical.

19 The contest was last Sunday, here at
20 Department.

21 We had nine contestants: District 1 was Max
22 Keck-Priest. District 2 was Tori Timmerman.
23 District 2 Runner-up was Chloe Frysinger. District
24 3 was Nissi Xavier. District 4 was Patience
25 Pershing. District 4 Runner-up was Lincoln

1 Charpentier. District 8 Runner-up was Chase
2 Hamilton. District 9 was Noah Young. And the
3 District 12 Runner-up was Namere Wedderburn.

4 The Department Runner-up was Nissi Xavier, from
5 District 3.

6 The Department winner that is going to the
7 National Oratorical Contest is Patience Pershing,
8 from District 4.

9 Thank you for all the volunteers that came out
10 and helped with Oratorical. None of that could
11 happen without you guys.

12 But if anyone is curious about Oratorical, it
13 is free to come out. I can throw you in a job or
14 you can just sit and watch it. But it's something
15 that, if you've not seen it, these kids will make
16 you feel dumb, in the best way.

17 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.

18 I'm going to second Christie's motion on this.
19 Because I had never been to the Oratorical. It just
20 never worked out in my schedule. She needed help
21 this year so I made sure we came out for it. My
22 wife and I sat in as a timer. And we've talked all
23 week about how amazing those kids are, just their
24 mannerisms, the way they carry themselves. If you
25 have a chance, I please urge you to come out. Just

1 attend it. You don't have to help. We'll find the
2 help. Just come out and enjoy seeing the young
3 people and what our future holds for us.

4 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd
5 District Commander.

6 The runner-up from the 3rd District was a
7 freshman.

8 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes.

9 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: I thought it was
10 unbelievably impressive. I got asked to judge in
11 our District levels. So it's my first experience
12 with Oratorical. Wow.

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Outstanding.

14 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yeah, we had quite a few
15 freshmen this year.

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Use your name, please, when
17 you talk.

18 Proceed.

19 COORDINATOR WHITE: Children and Youth, March
20 22nd, at 11:30, we had a virtual meeting.

21 It was moved and seconded to suspend the
22 reading of the minutes from the last meeting, and
23 motioned and seconded to accept the minutes as
24 corrected.

25 Promote Flag Education Comic Book. Districts

1 will have time to give their tests in schools.
2 Copies of the paperwork have been sent to each
3 commission chair.

4 Child Welfare Worker of the Year Packet.
5 Everyone should have received a new updated packet
6 in your packets. A packet will be given out at the
7 DEC meeting. It is also suggested that it's
8 mentioned at Department Convention so members there
9 are aware of the award and we can encourage them to
10 nominate someone.

11 Special Olympics is a program that fall under
12 Children and Youth. Not this past Friday but the
13 Friday before that, the Department did our very
14 first ever "Special Olympics Battle of Delaware
15 Super Polar Plunge," which was pretty awesome. It
16 was all of Department staff. We had Berlin Township
17 Fire Department. We had Delaware and Mount Gilead,
18 I believe, Troopers from the Ohio State Highway
19 Patrol, Delaware Police.

20 And the Delaware County Sheriff also agreed.
21 But at the time of our plunge, they just had not a
22 whole lot of deputies that were on duty. So they
23 are already on board for doing it next year.

24 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Define "polar."

25 COORDINATOR WHITE: We changed it to "Solar

1 Plunge," instead of "Polar Plunge."

2 We wanted people to participate. They're like,
3 "Oh, it's 20 degrees in January."

4 And I'm like, "What about the very last
5 possible day we can do it?"

6 Deal.

7 It still rained, though. It was 68 and rainy.

8 So between Department staff, the Highway
9 Patrol, Stockhands Horses for Healing, Berlin
10 Township, everybody that was involved in our "Battle
11 of Delaware Plunge," we raised a total of \$15,027
12 for Special Olympics.

13 (Applause).

14 It was awesome.

15 We put -- there were two different challenges
16 out there, that the District that had the highest
17 percentage or the highest amount donated could pie
18 the Adjutant in the face, and/or whatever punishment
19 of your choosing, as long as you don't draw blood.

20 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: A pie in the face.

21 COORDINATOR WHITE: We'll talk about it.

22 So, lucky enough, we didn't make rules if
23 there's a tie. So I guess two Districts won, which
24 JD doesn't know about this at all.

25 So District 10 and District 12, you better get

1 your punishments ready because both of your
2 Districts donated \$5,000 each.

3 And the Posts that had the most amount of money
4 are --

5 I don't know if anyone was at Mid-Winter
6 Conference, but our Special Olympics Athlete of the
7 Year, Seth, is also a huge birdhouse builder and
8 painter. That is his favorite thing to do. So he
9 wanted in on the challenge. And he said that
10 whatever Post donates the most money, he will custom
11 make a birdhouse for.

12 I have it. It is in my office. So, Post 144,
13 from District 12, donated \$5,000, just from their
14 Post.

15 (Applause).

16 So I will say they probably really wanted that
17 birdhouse. We may fight for it, because it's a
18 really cool birdhouse. But Post 144 got Seth's
19 birdhouse.

20 While we are on the subject of Special
21 Olympics, because it is a program of Children and
22 Youth, April 1st kicked off the Law Enforcement
23 Torch Run Program.

24 For those of you who don't know what Law
25 Enforcement Torch Run is, it's a program dedicated

1 to raising awareness and funds for Special Olympics,
2 fostering relationships between law enforcement and
3 the community, and celebrating the achievements of
4 Special Olympics athletes.

5 Upcoming Torch Run Event: They are gearing up
6 for the Torch Run fundraising event.

7 The Torch Run is a series of runs held across
8 the state involving law enforcement officers
9 carrying the "Flame of Hope," to raise funds and
10 awareness for Special Olympics Ohio.

11 Last year, there were 70 legs throughout the
12 state. And we're hoping this number grows this
13 year.

14 The event will run from June 9th through June
15 13th, culminating at the State Summer Games at Ohio
16 State University.

17 The goal for the Torch Run legs this year is to
18 incorporate the local American Legion Posts around
19 the state by connecting them with local,
20 community-based Special Olympics Ohio programs, law
21 enforcement members, and other first responders. We
22 are hoping this collaboration will strengthen
23 community ties and enhance the impact that Special
24 Olympics has of spreading inclusion for their
25 athletes.

1 They sent out an invitation. They would love
2 to invite any Legionnaires or Posts to join Special
3 Olympics for both the opening ceremonies, which is
4 June 13th, at 7:00 PM, location to be determined,
5 and the State Summer Games, which is June 13th
6 through 15th, throughout the campus of OSU. All
7 events are free and open to the public. And they we
8 would be thrilled to have any type of Legion
9 presence.

10 There's also a Torch Run introduction and
11 training Zoom meeting that they are going to put on
12 for The American Legion, for Posts, Districts,
13 individuals. If anyone wants to get involved,
14 please let me know. It is April 29th, at 5:30 PM.

15 Again, it's a Zoom meeting. So if you're
16 interested, let me know and I will add you to that.
17 And I will send it to all of the District Children
18 and Youth Chairmen.

19 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Special Olympics.

20 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes.

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: This requires a motion.
22 There's money involved.

23 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: No, it's just information.
24 We raised money. We're not giving it away yet.

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

1 COORDINATOR WHITE: That's all I got.

2 (Applause).

3 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Ken LaVoy, Finance
4 Chairman.

5 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Mr. Commander.

6 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes.

7 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Chris Emmons. 3rd
8 District Commander. I just have a question before
9 we move forward.

10 I stepped out to the restroom and I think we
11 were giving away the "Big 1 Pin" when I came back
12 in.

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes.

14 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: I'm just curious why
15 we did that, because --

16 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It should be the "Little 1
17 Pins" that were given out at this meeting.

18 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Yeah. Because the
19 big ones, those are based off May's membership. And
20 we've still got --

21 1VC OREN: My fault.

22 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Okay.

23 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We just have to switch the
24 pins out. There's small "Big 1 Pins" that we give
25 out at DEC meetings.

1 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Okay.

2 Because we're still going to win it. We've
3 still got time left.

4 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Good observation. Good
5 observation.

6 You're on, Ken.

7 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Thank you.

8 With your permission, I'd also like to cover
9 the National Convention update and BALC as well.

10 COMMANDER WHATLEY: You may.

11 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Thank you, sir.

12 All right, real quick. I promise this will be
13 quick.

14 The Finance meeting minutes for the commission
15 have gone out.

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Can I have your attention,
17 please.

18 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: I do want to cover a couple
19 key highlights of our meeting minutes.

20 One, we brought up about the Commander's
21 vehicle for discussion at the last DEC. That has
22 now gone and been approved by the Finance
23 Commission, as well as gone through I.A.

24 And it reads as such, for those of you who did
25 not look thoroughly at the minutes: The Department

1 Adjutant and the Finance Commission agreed the that
2 future Commander's vehicle will be purchased by the
3 Department of Ohio and used by the incoming
4 Commander. The vehicle cost will be up to \$50,000,
5 which, after 50,000 miles, will be used for a
6 trade-in on the next vehicle. The Department will
7 keep the Commander's insurance. The Commander's
8 spouse can be added to that at their cost.

9 Are there any questions regarding that?

10 And if you remember, one of the reasons was
11 because we had such a limited amount of money
12 because of the cost increases on vehicles that we
13 were giving the Commander each year that the
14 Commander was coming out of pocket, substantially,
15 to pay for a Commander's vehicle.

16 So it was coming down to: Do we increase the
17 amount that we're giving the Commander every year,
18 and that keep going up exponentially, or do we go
19 ahead and do a purchase that allows incoming
20 Commanders to go ahead and run for office where
21 they're not having to put money out of pocket for a
22 vehicle?

23 Yes, ma'am.

24 5TH DISTRICT 1VC RODGERS: Melissa Rodgers, 5th
25 District.

1 The only concern, or one of the concerns I have
2 with this concept is the liability issue. With the
3 Department buying it, if they were to get in an
4 accident, would that not make the Department liable
5 rather than the incoming Commander, or the
6 Commander?

7 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Okay, one, for the insurance,
8 JD has his hand up, very quickly.

9 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Adjutant Robinson.

10 The vehicle is always titled to the Department
11 while the Commander is in office. They do not
12 receive the title for the vehicle into their name
13 until afterwards. So it would be the same exact
14 thing as what we're doing now.

15 5TH DISTRICT 1VC RODGERS: Okay. I was just
16 wondering about it.

17 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Sure, I understand. Thank
18 you.

19 Jason.

20 PDC RUE: Jason Rue, PDC.

21 So my question is: I heard you guys did
22 research on when would be the best time to turn this
23 in, when we get our best bang for our buck on the
24 trade-in?

25 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Correct.

1 PDC RUE: So this is being done, in part, to
2 help save money for Department?

3 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: That is correct.

4 PDC RUE: What is the cost of the \$25,000 we
5 will have in our pocket for possibly our third year,
6 or up to \$65,000, compared to what that street value
7 is? I'm guessing a \$10,000 difference, from 50 to
8 65.

9 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Based on, based on today's
10 rates, yeah, it's about that.

11 PDC RUE: But that's 15,000 more dollars in our
12 pocket, extending that out to that extra, because
13 we're not spending that 25,000, up to 25,000, that
14 year.

15 So instead of two years or 50,000, let's do
16 three years or 65,000 miles, because it will give us
17 the most bang for our buck when we're doing that
18 trade-in and putting money back in our pocket.

19 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Yeah, the commission went back
20 and forth on 50,000 miles, 60,000 miles, two years
21 versus three years. And through the research, it
22 came back that it was 50,000 or two years for the
23 max trade-in.

24 PDC RUE: But that's trade-in. That's not
25 counting the money we're saving by going the third

1 year, by not doling that money out. Instead of
2 doling the money out, that's \$25,000 back into the
3 Department's pocket that year that they would have
4 spent on a vehicle.

5 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: I understand.

6 PDC RUE: Are they taking that into account on
7 that?

8 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Yes.

9 And we also looked at, if everybody remembers,
10 we also looked at leasing versus purchasing as an
11 option as well.

12 PDC RUE: So we're going to be roughly \$20,000
13 more trading it in after two than a third?

14 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Dean.

15 I know Dean researched as well with regards to
16 that. So I'll hand off to him.

17 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: Dean Boyers from the
18 1st District.

19 It basically worked out to the cost, I believe,
20 I don't have my paperwork with me, but I think it
21 was about \$15,000 a year. Regardless of whether we
22 kept it two years, three years, it all balanced out
23 down the line.

24 I understand what you're saying, Jason. But,
25 realistically, it doesn't matter whether we keep

1 that car, because the value of the car is far
2 greater after two years. You lose the most
3 depreciation keeping it that third year. So trading
4 it in at two years, 50,000 miles, or three years,
5 65,000 miles, it really made the balance to be
6 fairly close to the same.

7 PDC RUE: So what you're saying is that it is
8 roughly 20 to \$25,000 --

9 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: No.

10 PDC RUE: -- we're going to lose on that third
11 year by keeping it that time.

12 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: No, no.

13 PDC RUE: Because that's the money we have in
14 our pocket for that year, that we don't have to
15 spend on a vehicle.

16 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: If you spend \$50,000
17 on a vehicle now and you trade it in after two
18 years, I'm just going to use the numbers off the top
19 of my head, that car, trading it in, would be worth,
20 say \$26,000, after two years, versus keeping it
21 three years, then you're down to like 19,000. So,
22 you know --

23 PDC RUE: So we're losing \$7,000 --

24 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: We're not losing, no.

25 PDC RUE: We're gaining \$7,000 by putting it

1 roughly a year ahead of time, is what you're saying,
2 the two-year, 50. But we're spending the \$25,000
3 also that we have in our pocket as a Department for
4 that extra year.

5 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: It almost, the way it
6 works out, it almost works out like a lease, because
7 you're still, you're maintaining the trade-in value
8 of the vehicle by trading it in early. So we
9 figured it out, what is going to be most effective,
10 what it's going to cost us per year, to keep that
11 vehicle. And keeping it two years, it maintains the
12 most value. So if you trade it in early, then it's
13 not going to cost us that \$25,000. We looked at
14 what it cost us per year by trading it in and
15 maintaining the most value of that vehicle when we
16 trade it in.

17 PDC RUE: I'm just saying if we have \$25,000,
18 so you're doing \$50,000, --

19 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: Okay.

20 PDC RUE: -- which is based off the 25,000 per
21 year, correct, max, for the two years, I'm perfectly
22 fine with that. So we spend that money. We use it
23 for two years.

24 In that third year, if we use it, we wouldn't
25 have to spend that \$25,000, where now we have to

1 spend at least a portion of that on a trade-in,
2 instead of pocketing whatever money that is.

3 I think the most bang for the buck comes at
4 three years --

5 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Jason, can I interrupt for
6 just a second?

7 To clarify what the motion actually should be
8 stated in the Finance minutes, it was just
9 50,000 miles. There was no year limit on it.

10 So if the Commanders drive 10,000, we'll have
11 it for five years. If they drive 25,000 a year, we
12 got two years. So it's up to how much the Commander
13 is doing on how often we will trade the vehicle in.
14 We are looking at mileage, not so much years.
15 Because the years did not really make that much of a
16 difference. It was the mileage on the vehicle.

17 And 50,000 seemed to be the best spot, the
18 Finance Committee, myself, could find to trade a
19 vehicle in at. Fifty to 60,000 is the sweet range
20 where we need to trade that vehicle in.

21 TREASURER LEWIS: Holly Lewis, Department
22 Treasurer.

23 The other thing is, AJ has probably only
24 driven, what, 5,000 miles this year?

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Not quite that.

1 TREASURER LEWIS: Yeah.

2 So, I mean, I know you did a little bit more.
3 I'll probably do a little bit more because I'm on
4 the other side of the state. But, you know, it's
5 going to work out to more than two years.

6 CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Commander.

7 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes.

8 ASST CHAPLAIN WHITE: If I might add something,
9 a little food for thought.

10 I am a retired master auto technician. I've
11 been in the automotive business for 45 years.

12 Once you hit 36,000 miles, you're out of
13 warranty. So when you start pumping dollars into
14 this thing to fix it, you're talking a larger
15 expense also.

16 TREASURER LEWIS: Sure.

17 CHAPLAIN DISTEL: So it's just some food for
18 thought to take into consideration.

19 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Thank you.

20 So, just to clarify, it is mileage. It's not
21 years. We did discuss the years on that, thinking
22 that, based on the amount of average miles that a
23 Commander drives, it would be approximately two,
24 maybe two and a half, maybe three.

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Just a point of

1 order. Parliamentarian Minadeo.

2 Are years mentioned in the resolution?

3 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: In the minutes?

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: In the minutes.

5 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: No.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Okay.

7 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Last question.

8 2VC COX, JR.: Gary Cox, Jr., Department 2nd
9 Vice.

10 One of the questions I had, JD and I were
11 talking about it last night, would the Commander be
12 able to utilize the vehicle to drive it to the
13 National Convention?

14 So, I mean, if you were taking your vehicle
15 that you had this year, you would be driving down to
16 Tampa. You (indicating) would be driving down to
17 Louisville. I would be going to Kansas City.

18 Would that be a possibility to be able to use
19 that as the vehicle for that?

20 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: That wasn't discussed.

21 I mean, it's your vehicle. I would say, hey,
22 if you want to drive it that far -- Holly is pretty
23 much as far as Tampa right now.

24 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd
25 District.

1 That should be something that's in our SOP for
2 travel and expenses.

3 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It will be updated in
4 there. It's not in there yet.

5 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Yeah, I agree.

6 NEC CHAPMAN: Chapman, NEC.

7 I think the answer to your question would be
8 yes. That's Legion business. It's important Legion
9 business if he's driving to it. I drove to Utah.

10 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Yeah, I don't see an issue
11 with that.

12 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Suzette Heller, 12th
13 District 1st Vice.

14 However, technically, the Department Convention
15 is way before National Convention. So when the
16 Commander takes office in June or July, that
17 National Convention is not until August. And so the
18 Past Department Commander is technically the
19 delegate to the National Convention in August. So
20 now you've got a Department Commander who has the
21 vehicle and now you have a delegate to the National
22 Convention who's technically the delegate. So now
23 you've got two Commanders but the car belongs to the
24 Department Commander current, that just got elected.

25 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: I see your point.

1 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah.

2 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: But I'll let the NEC --

3 NEC CHAPMAN: To answer your question, Suzette,
4 in part, I guess, the new Department Commander is
5 not actually ratified until --

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: The National Convention.

7 NEC CHAPMAN: -- the National Convention.
8 During the National Convention is when they're
9 ratified.

10 CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Well, they could both drive.

11 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: I would say that's discussion
12 for the SOP, not so much that we're going to go
13 ahead and approve a vehicle, not how it's used so
14 much, because we can go down that rabbit hole.

15 NEC CHAPMAN: I know it's a little different
16 right now, but we used to always wait until they got
17 back from convention to sign the title, to change
18 the title.

19 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: No, that is not
20 true. Because the --

21 NEC CHAPMAN: Yes, it is.

22 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Hold on a second,
23 Chappy.

24 At the August DEC, the Commander has the gavel.
25 The Commander has the gavel at the August DEC. This

1 is true, right?

2 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: True.

3 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: The Commander has
4 the gavel at the August DEC.

5 So, yeah, so the Commander is ratified at the
6 convention, at the Department Convention. They get
7 sworn in at Department Convention along with the
8 DEC. Everybody is sworn in at Department
9 Convention. And that transition takes place
10 somewhere between -- it takes place right there at
11 Department Convention. That is the Department
12 Commander, yeah. And the Commander has the gavel at
13 the August DEC.

14 So that transition between Department
15 Convention and National Convention, there is a
16 transition happening. The cap has changed. So the
17 Past Department Commander, there's a cap-changing
18 ceremony. They only wear their cap at National
19 Convention, which is, technically, from the
20 Department standpoint, they're the Past Department
21 Commander. As soon as that Department Convention
22 closes, that's the Past Department Commander.

23 NEC CHAPMAN: But the Past Department Commander
24 has the cap at National Convention.

25 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Right.

1 NEC CHAPMAN: But I drove my car out there.

2 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah, because that
3 was titled to you. This is a different situation.

4 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Can we move on?

5 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: So that is something
6 to consider.

7 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: All right. Again, those are
8 all discussions for the SOP.

9 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah.

10 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Commander, the other two
11 highlights I want to mention in regards to the
12 minutes was that, if you hadn't noticed when you
13 pulled in this morning, the Department has a new
14 vehicle that's out there. It's a Ford Explorer. It
15 has a placard on it. So they've went ahead and got
16 a little stronger vehicle and traded in their Honda
17 CR-V so it can more adequately tow as well.

18 Speaking of towing, they're looking at updating
19 their trailer. They've got a single-axle trailer
20 that was a used trailer and they're wanting to go
21 ahead with a double-axle trailer and then get it
22 wrapped so it promotes The Legion.

23 Commander, I'll go ahead and ask for a motion
24 now on the minutes.

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: We will need a motion from

1 the floor.

2 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Suzette Heller, 12th
3 District 1st Vice, I make that motion.

4 5TH DISTRICT 1VC RODGERS: Melissa Rodgers, 1st
5 Vice, 5th District. I second the motion.

6 COMMANDER WHATLEY: A motion has been properly
7 made and seconded.

8 Any discussion?

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

10 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any discussion?

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

12 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, all those for
13 it by saying aye.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

15 COMMANDER WHATLEY: All against, no.

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carries.

18 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: All right, thank you,
19 Commander.

20 Real quick on the budget, the budget versus
21 actual. I just want to draw attention to two items.
22 One is A&G and one is Baseball. That's 41210 and
23 line item 41310.

24 If you look, the percentages are way off. It's
25 showing that we have lots of money and we're well

1 under budget. What that basically equates to is,
2 when we do the budget again for next year, or this
3 year, rather, coming to a close, we need to budget
4 more. We didn't budget adequately and so we're just
5 going to correct that going forward so that it's
6 more in line.

7 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Information?

8 CHAIRMAN LaVOY: Yeah, it's just for
9 information.

10 All right, real quick, changing hats,
11 Convention Commission.

12 As you're aware, in 2028, Ohio will host the
13 convention. We've sent our officers for the
14 Convention Corporation and all the committee chairs
15 up to National and they have acknowledged receipt.

16 The next item that will happen is that they
17 will come down in December and sign the contracts
18 with the hotel. And JD and myself will be meeting
19 the Convention Commission representatives to take
20 care of that.

21 As I had mentioned during the winter
22 conference, we have convention committees. If you
23 have not signed up and you want to be a part of the
24 convention committees, please see me afterwards.

25 I'm going to go down through those very quickly

1 so you know which committees are still needing
2 bodies. And that's badges and packets, information
3 and registration, liaison responsibilities, special
4 events, memorial service, and distinguished guests.

5 Now, moving on to BALC.

6 BALC, Buckeye American Legion College, we have
7 over 200 and, I think, 39 individuals that are
8 registered that need practicals. And so due to
9 conflicts here at Department, we're going to offer
10 that training on-line. That will be this month, on
11 the 12th. It will probably be approximately just
12 under three hours. It will be a Teams meeting.

13 Once that instruction is provided, there will
14 be homework for the students. And they will bring
15 that with them to convention. If they're unable to
16 attend convention, they can mail that in.

17 So we're just going to be covering practicals.
18 Holly and I will be providing that training.

19 So, barring any questions, Commander, that
20 concludes my reports. Thank you very much.

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

22 William Genochio.

23 COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: All right, good morning.
24 We're still before chow here.

25 So the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation

1 Committee met Saturday, March 22nd, 2025, at 11:00
2 AM. This was our in-person hearing.

3 It was called to order at 11:00 AM by David
4 Cook of the 6th District. He was appointed himself
5 as secretary. We conducted the Pledge and the
6 invocation was given by Darell Bishop.

7 We have one vacant District. We had 11
8 attending the meeting. So we definitely had a
9 quorum.

10 We suspended the reading of the previous
11 minutes.

12 We had District reports.

13 The 1st District stated that the Toledo clinic
14 is moving to an e-sign in when you go to your
15 appointments. Instead of having to wait at the
16 desk, you can sign in. Wade Park has it already. I
17 think a lot of them do.

18 2nd District: The Auxiliary handed out items
19 to Veterans.

20 3rd District: March 25th and April 22nd,
21 they'll be having training for care and compassion
22 for helping wounded veterans in a WOW event at 6:00
23 PM to 7:30.

24 The 4th District gave out handouts on VAVS
25 committees.

1 5th District: No report.

2 6th District: Things at the Columbus Clinic
3 are going back to normal, the way they were
4 pre-COVID.

5 The 7th District talked about a June carnival.
6 They had their 45 veterans in attendance.
7 Appreciation Day, July 19th of 2025, they'll have
8 ballgame that day. They have a "Make-a-Wish" called
9 "Hope" doing something. We don't know what exactly
10 yet, but he will attend and see what's going on
11 there.

12 The 8th is our vacant District.

13 The 9th District is doing bingo on the third
14 Sundays at the hospital.

15 The 10th was no report.

16 The 11th, they're talking about Vietnam
17 Veterans of the Year. Also, a hall of fame was held
18 at the college to tell stories about their service.
19 And they're working on their Gifts for Yanks
20 donations and bettering what that District is
21 providing to that.

22 No report from the 12th.

23 The 13th District, VAVS was no report but
24 they're going to the hospital on Friday, October
25 11th.

1 And the 14th, no report.

2 Unfinished business: We talked about Veterans
3 Treatment Court. No requests or comments about what
4 anybody needs, so that money is still sitting there.
5 And so if you have a request for Veterans Treatment
6 Courts in your Districts, you can get with the VA&R
7 Commission on what you need.

8 We went over it quickly. I won't steal too
9 much of Jacob's thunder. But we did go over the
10 bills. We had several bills that were introduced to
11 the House and the Senate to help the veterans.

12 I know the National Vice Commander talked about
13 the 1282, which has changed, it's now the 1201, but
14 the Major Star Act.

15 There are a couple others that have been
16 reintroduced, which are helpful.

17 House Resolution 303, that allows the receipt
18 of both military retired pay and veterans'
19 disability pay with respect to service-connected
20 disabilities. Under the current law, only
21 individuals with a disability of 50 percent or more
22 can receive both. So that, we did look that up, it
23 has been reintroduced, as well as House Resolution
24 333, which would be to amend the Title X of the
25 United States Code to permit additional retired

1 members of the armed forces who have
2 service-connected disabilities to receive both
3 disability compensation from the Department of
4 Veterans Affairs and their disability pay,
5 disability retired pay, for reasons of military
6 service or a combat-related service compensation.

7 Both of those have been reintroduced, as well
8 as the Major Star.

9 We talked about our DSO report. The main thing
10 is we have hired a new DSO in Chillicothe, Troy
11 Elliott. He's a U.S. Army veteran. The guy is
12 sharp, picking up the information real quick. He is
13 eager to help veterans. So he's going to be a great
14 asset there.

15 We do have some good news. We did finally list
16 the Cincinnati area. It's not going to be at the
17 medical center. We finally relisted that job
18 posting.

19 There's issues with the hospital. They only
20 have space for us three days a week, and they to
21 desk share.

22 I talked with the Adjutant. We're not going to
23 find a good candidate to work three days a week. So
24 I've coordinated with the VFW. They are giving us
25 an office space off of Elm Street, which is the VR&E

1 building. So we'll have a full time, five day a
2 week, DSO there. So I'm accepting applications if
3 anybody is interested.

4 Gifts for Yanks, Darell gave a report, Darell
5 Bishop of the 5th District, and gave the monies
6 donated by Districts to the commission.

7 The main reason for our meeting in person was
8 to discuss Department and National Awards.
9 Unfortunately, none were submitted. Jerry Perry did
10 take a packet for a VA&R. I haven't received it
11 back yet, so no awards are being submitted for VA&R.

12 We had no resolutions.

13 The good of the order: They talked about a
14 flag flown over the U.S. Constitution at a Post.
15 John Tipper stated that the Vietnam Veterans of
16 America put in a formal award for the Donut Dollies,
17 to recognize them for their service. And then I
18 mentioned that the Legion Riders would be looking at
19 donations, and JD will talk more on that, kind of
20 like Gifts for Yanks does to raise money.

21 Other than that, the closing prayer was given
22 by Darell Bishop, we saluted the colors, and the
23 meeting was adjourned at 12:00 PM.

24 Commander, that is my report, barring any
25 questions.

1 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you, sir.

2 COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Thank you.

3 COMMANDER WHATLEY: We now have Jacob, and he's
4 doing the Legislative and National Security.

5 COORDINATOR BRAULT: Good morning, everybody.
6 Well, good afternoon. I'll try and keep this very
7 short and sweet.

8 I'll start off with National Security.

9 We met Saturday, March 22nd, at 1:00 PM, on
10 electronic virtual Teams.

11 Chairman Buxton was absent due to personal
12 reasons, so 3rd District Chairman Bob Weiler
13 volunteered to be chairman for the commission.

14 We did not have a quorum, so the commission
15 decided to have no discussion and adjourn until a
16 later time.

17 Chairman Buxton requested that an electronic
18 vote be sent out to the commission on the 911
19 Dispatcher of the Year criteria and the CPR Awards
20 packet. The criteria would be the same as Law
21 Enforcement Officer, with the specific changes if it
22 did not apply to a dispatcher position. That vote
23 did not pass due to not enough votes.

24 That's National Security. Any questions on
25 that one?

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 COORDINATOR BRAULT: All right.

3 The Legislative Commission, they met on March
4 22nd, Saturday, at 2:30 PM, by virtual. A quorum
5 was not present. Chairman White decided to continue
6 on discussions only.

7 The commission discussed changing the due dates
8 for the Legislator of the Year Award packet and
9 Chairman White requested an electronic vote be sent
10 out to modify the due dates of said award to be 30
11 days prior to Department Convention, starting in the
12 2026-2027 membership year. That vote also did not
13 pass due to not enough votes.

14 That's for the Legislative Commission report.
15 Any questions?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COORDINATOR BRAULT: Okay.

18 Then I have a couple bills topics for you guys
19 in the legislative world.

20 Like Genochio said, the Major Richard Star Act
21 has been reintroduced into the 119th Congress. It
22 currently has not had much traction as of yet. It's
23 in the House Armed Service Veterans Committee.

24 A brief synopsis of it is eliminating the
25 offset between DOD retirement pay and VA disability

1 pay for those that have a rating of at least 10
2 percent, with less than 20 years of service. It's
3 majority for combat-disabled veterans who are
4 medically retired.

5 When the time comes, I will be asking you all
6 to push it to your Posts and people throughout your
7 District for support, and your congressmen, whether
8 it's writing, e-mail, calling. All that can help
9 get a bill passed.

10 On the state side, we have House Concurrent
11 Resolution 7 that's currently going through. It's a
12 resolution to recognize Buckeye Boys State and
13 Buckeye Girls State as premier leadership
14 educational program across the state. In the coming
15 weeks, Christie and myself will be going to the
16 statehouse to give proponent testimony on that.

17 House Bill 117, that's sponsored by Tracy
18 Richardson. It is to enact the Pledge of Allegiance
19 in every city, local exempt village, and joint
20 vocational school district. They will have a set
21 time and manner for a daily reciting of the Pledge
22 of Allegiance. Teachers will also be encouraged to
23 create lessons related to the American flag and
24 Pledge of Allegiance.

25 This is a great step towards getting civics

1 back to the classrooms. I know it's a small step.
2 But to get to the bigger steps, you have to take the
3 smaller steps first.

4 House Bill 40, that is increasing the homestead
5 exemption for 100 percent permanent and total
6 disabled veterans. It is currently at 56,000.
7 They're increasing it to \$100,000 on your home's tax
8 assessed value.

9 The final piece is The American Legion License
10 Plate. It will be available at the BMV starting
11 April 9th. I do not know if it's going to be
12 certain BMV locations to start then filter out. I
13 will get that information on the 9th from the BMV.

14 Any questions on bills?

15 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

16 COORDINATOR BRAULT: That's all I have,
17 Commander.

18 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you, Jacob.

19 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Thank you, Jacob.
20 (Applause).

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Let's give our Department
22 staff a round of applause for a job well done.

23 (Applause).

24 Thank you. Thank you.

25 Now we have our Adjutant, JD Robinson --

1 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: No.

2 2VC COX, JR.: Jon Vulgamore.

3 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Come on, Jon. I overlooked
4 you.

5 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: And then there's
6 Jon.

7 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Sorry about that, Jon.

8 COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: Hey, it happens all the
9 time.

10 Thank you, everyone. Good morning, or
11 afternoon.

12 Chair Chris Emmons called the virtual meeting
13 of the Department Marketing, Media and
14 Communications Commission (sic) to order at 11:03,
15 on Saturday, March 22nd, with a salute to the
16 colors, and also gave the invocation. The Pledge of
17 Allegiance was also led by Chair Emmons and recited
18 by all present.

19 The meeting secretary appointment was
20 substituted by all present agreeing to be digitally.
21 recorded by Microsoft Teams.

22 Roll call was next, and produced nine members
23 present and one guest, which was myself.

24 Due to the previous meeting minutes being
25 e-mailed, the commission members agreed to waive the

1 reading of the meeting minutes and entertained a
2 motion to approve. And Jacqueline Whetstone so
3 motioned. Holly Lewis, District 10, seconded. No
4 discussion was offered and the vote passed, motion
5 carried.

6 The next motionable item we discuss was OLN
7 advertising. Due to the resizing of the newsletter
8 and it no longer being printed, it was suggested at
9 the previous meeting that research be done to see if
10 we needed to change our price and sizing scheme for
11 those ads submitted to us.

12 After some lengthy discussion, Bob Mason moved
13 to entertain that OLN advertising prices be up to
14 the discretion of the staff, and generating as much
15 revenue as possible, obviously. Jacqueline
16 Whetstone seconded the motion. No discussion was
17 offered, and the vote also passed unanimously.

18 The only other thing I wanted to mention, this
19 is not a motionable item on the meeting, but if you
20 look through your stack of papers there, you'll see
21 these cards (indicating). This, Holly mentioned
22 this earlier, this is what our campaign will look
23 like for getting members e-mails to be updated,
24 maybe even their phone numbers, because that's on
25 the horizon too, with our text marketing.

1 So, yeah, if you need more of these, let me
2 know. I'm going to print out a whole mess and we'll
3 go to all our meetings and events, programs,
4 conference, convention, and we'll hand them out. So
5 it's just a nice tool to keep in your back pocket
6 and keep everybody linked and connected.

7 So, after a few good of the commission and
8 announcements, Chair Emmons is stepping down as our
9 chairman. And we want to thank him for his years of
10 service with the MMC Commission.

11 The meeting was adjourned at 11:42.

12 That concludes my report, Commander.

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

14 Do you have any questions for Jon?

15 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, thank you.

17 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Thank you, Jon.

18 (Applause).

19 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Our Adjutant, JD Robinson,
20 for Internal Affairs, Sons of The American Legion,
21 and Legion Riders.

22 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I'm back.

23 So, we already covered the car through the
24 Finances. I.A. agreed with that. So that is a done
25 point.

1 The other hot topic that I.A. covered was an
2 updated credit card policy and expense policies.
3 They were sent out to you. I.A. approved them.
4 This body would have to ratify that. And I will ask
5 the Commander to go over it.

6 Is there any questions before he gets up here?

7 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

8 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Perfect.

9 COMMANDER WHATLEY: I need a motion for the
10 credit card policy, since it's already been sent
11 out.

12 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Chris Emmons,
13 Commander, 3rd District, so moves.

14 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
15 District, seconds.

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: The motion has been
17 properly made and seconded.

18 Any discussion?

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

20 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any discussion?

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

22 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, those for it
23 by saying aye.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Those against, no.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carries.

3 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Thanks, Commander.

4 All right, going from that, we'll go into the
5 Sons of The American Legion.

6 The Mid-Winter Detachment Executive Committee
7 meeting was held on January 17th, at the Marriott
8 Columbus Northwest Hotel in Dublin.

9 National employment recommendations were
10 approved: Bill Towns for Historian; John Conley,
11 CWF; Mike Kennedy, Internal Affairs; Bernie Kessler,
12 Legislative; Scot Thornton, Assistant Adjutant;
13 Buster Sutterlin, VA&R; Jeff Vrabel, Jr., for
14 Internal Affairs.

15 The following donations from the futures
16 project were approved: Ohio American Legion
17 Baseball, 1500; Operation Comfort Warriors, 1,000;
18 Pacific Palisades Squadron 283, in California, 500;
19 North Carolina disaster relief, 500.

20 The Detachment Convention will be held May,
21 16th, 17th and 18th, in Chillicothe.

22 This report was from Skip Craun, Chairman of
23 the SAL Advisory Committee.

24 Any questions anybody wants to know about SAL?

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: All right, moving on.
2 Legion Riders.

3 As Bill has been our liaison for the Legion
4 Riders for many years, they report to him then he
5 reports to me then he reports back to them. So, in
6 trying to streamline what is going on, I asked Bill
7 and the Commanders if I could have more access to
8 the program so we could cut the middleman out and
9 have better communication between the Department and
10 the Department American Legion Riders.

11 I have been to four Riders' meetings so far.
12 There's some issues within the Riders. But the
13 biggest issue I see is our lack of putting our
14 Legionnaires that are the liaisons back to the
15 District, and the directors from your Districts,
16 showing up for meetings so we can conduct business.

17 We had a meeting here for all the state
18 directors in early March. And we had to make phone
19 calls to get a quorum to be able to conduct
20 business. We should not have to do that.

21 You incoming Commanders, find people that are
22 willing to do the work. Just don't put a warm body
23 that has a pulse in those positions.

24 The SAL and the Legion Riders, they deserve
25 your utmost respect. Because they are doing a lot

1 of our backbone work that our Legionnaires no longer
2 are able to because of their age or their health
3 issues. They are a major part of our organization.
4 And if we're not giving them our all, we are letting
5 our organization down.

6 Off my soapbox.

7 One thing that did come out of the meeting,
8 they are going to do a modified Legacy-Run-type
9 thing this year, where each District Director will
10 get ahold of all the Posts in their District and
11 they will schedule a run to drive around from Post
12 to Post to collect donations. Once all the
13 donations are collected, they will either meet here
14 at Department or at Department Convention and we
15 will present the check to the Department Commander.

16 Anybody have questions on Legion Riders?

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

18 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: All right. That is my
19 report, Commander.

20 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

21 I would like to take a break for lunch. And we
22 will have a working lunch. But I need a motion from
23 the floor for that. Okay, have your lunch and be
24 back in in about ten minutes.

25 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I'd give them 20. They

1 can't go through the line in ten minutes.

2 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Five minutes.

3 Twenty minutes, 20 minutes.

4 (THEREUPON, THE PROCEEDINGS STOOD IN RECESS).

5 I would like to reconvene the DEC.

6 . . . CALL TO ORDER . . .

7 Colors of our nation in place, hand salute.

8 Two.

9 . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

10 We have charters and suspensions by JD

11 Robinson, Adjutant.

12 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Welcome back from lunch.

13 So, starting with our closing Posts and closing

14 Squadrons: Post 46, Post 99, 132, 227, 305, 334,

15 560. Squadron 99, Squadron 305.

16 All of these have been done correctly. Their

17 articles of incorporation have been ended if they

18 have them. They are ready to go to the NEC for the

19 vote in May.

20 Is there any questions on why we are closing

21 these Posts?

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

23 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It is all their choice to

24 close. We are not dictating or asking a Post to

25 close that did not want to close or merge.

1 We are continually working with other Squadrons
2 and Posts on mergers. I know of five or six
3 outstanding that we're working on.

4 Something you want to look at within your
5 Districts are if a Post not performing. We had one
6 Post, 227, they had 27 PUFL members. They sold
7 their building off about eight years ago, paid for
8 all their members to have PUFL memberships, and just
9 walked away, we're done. They thought they closed
10 then.

11 We're like, "No, no, you never closed."

12 They're like, "Well, we don't want to do
13 anything. Put us wherever you want."

14 So I called a local Post Commander. I'm like,
15 "I got 27 PUFLS."

16 He's like, "Yeah, I'll take them. Not a
17 problem."

18 So we went through and got all their paperwork
19 done up and got them on the list to close.

20 But look around your Districts. I promise you
21 every District has them. They're underperforming
22 Posts. The community can be better served by having
23 a stronger Post that might be a little farther away
24 than a Post that is underperforming and doesn't have
25 the support capabilities to perform well within

1 their community.

2 COMMANDER WHATLEY: I need a motion to accept
3 the closing of these Posts.

4 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: Commander, Dean
5 Boyers from the 1st District so moves.

6 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
7 District, seconds.

8 COMMANDER WHATLEY: The motion has been
9 properly made and seconded.

10 Any discussion?

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

12 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Any discussion?

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

14 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, all for it by
15 saying aye.

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

17 COMMANDER WHATLEY: All against, no.

18 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

19 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carried.

20 Resolutions/Constitutional Amendments, none.

21 Unfinished business.

22 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: The first one on the sheet
23 is the 50/50 Fantom Gaming. I know Holly's went
24 over it. We made a little bit of money. It's
25 continuing to grow.

1 I have done this quite consistently when I've
2 been talking in different places. Do we all have
3 these (indicating), or 99 percent of us?

4 So you turn that on. You pull up your home
5 screen and you go to your web browser. Real easy.
6 Type in "Ohio Legion" -- it is not. So you go to
7 The American Legion Department of Ohio. From there
8 it pulls up our web site. Real easy. In the top
9 right corner, there's three bars. You click on it.
10 There we go. And then it pulls up our directory of
11 all of our stuff. At the very bottom you see
12 "Gaming." You click on "Gaming" and it takes you
13 right to the 50/50. You scroll down and our jackpot
14 is sitting at 700.

15 The next time I look at this, somebody in here
16 better have bought some tickets. We need money.

17 But, on that point, your Posts need money too.
18 And they can make money off of this. They get
19 20 percent of every dollar that is spent into their
20 Post for it.

21 This is not necessarily a Legion event. Take
22 this outside of the community, or into the
23 community. This is for your Post and your Districts
24 to be able to, well, the Districts can't, but your
25 Posts can generate, very easily, funds to them.

1 I believe Mr. Boyers' Post was what, roughly
2 \$100 that you guys generated?

3 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: About that, yeah.

4 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: And it took how much work,
5 Dean?

6 1ST DISTRICT 1VC BOYERS: Not a lot.

7 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: So, I got a printout here.
8 And it's upside-down for you right now, but all of
9 those are the Posts that participated (indicating).

10 The issue is: I don't want to send out a check
11 for less than \$10. I've got Posts on here that get
12 90 cents. So it's going to take that Post a little
13 while to earn enough money to get a check. We're
14 going to have to keep the spreadsheet. But I would
15 like to make you guys aware that if a Post is like,
16 "Well, hey, I played and I didn't get my check."
17 Well, yeah, but how much did you actually get in
18 return? Because we have to have a certain point
19 where it costs us more to send that check than what
20 the check is.

21 Ten dollars has been on Post credits and
22 Squadron credits. So I'm going to carry that over
23 with the Finance Committee. We haven't discussed
24 it, but I'm sure they'll agree that we don't want to
25 cost our Department more money than what we need to.

1 So if you do hear from a Post that they played
2 but they didn't get any money, call me. We'll look
3 it up. And we can probably, nine out of ten times,
4 the only reason they won't get their check would be
5 they just haven't earned enough money to get a check
6 yet.

7 But that fast, that easy. You can go in, play
8 the game. There's a couple Posts that got 20, 30,
9 \$50. So it's nice and easy.

10 Bob, you paying attention?

11 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: I'm getting ready to
12 buy some tickets.

13 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: All right, I like that. I
14 like that.

15 But I'm going to need your support on this next
16 topic. So --

17 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: All right.

18 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Post 767 (sic), in
19 Mansfield, has come back and asked for permission to
20 use their facilities again. The DEC, under Ms.
21 Heller, that I was on, --

22 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: 676?

23 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yeah. Did I say the wrong
24 number? I apologize. It's 676. I just read wrong.

25 -- we voted to suspend them from using their

1 facility because of nefarious dealings that happened
2 at the Post. Not necessarily the Post's fault, but
3 it is a bad location.

4 Their officers of the Post the last year and a
5 half have taken the Post back by storm. They are
6 making great strides and updates to the Post. And
7 they have petitioned me, to petition this body, to
8 be able to use their Post home again.

9 I would like to entertain, through the
10 Commander --

11 COMMANDER WHATLEY: So be it.

12 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: If Bob would like to speak
13 on this for a second, as he did most of the work
14 with the Post.

15 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Well, as the Adjutant
16 said, they had a lot of issues there. But after we
17 banned them from using their property, they went
18 someplace else and had meetings. And all the
19 illegal activity stopped.

20 The property, where the property is, they were
21 hoping to sell the property but it failed.

22 So my problem is, I'd want to go back and see
23 the property and see what improvements they're
24 making to prevent the problems coming back.

25 Because one of the issues was the police

1 department sent me a flyer, American Legion parking
2 lot, this weekend we're going to have a drug sale
3 there, basically is what it said. And the police
4 department had the flyer. And that's what was going
5 on.

6 And what happens when you got drugs? People
7 got guns. Right? So you never know what's going to
8 happen.

9 But anyways, I would like to go back and see
10 what they've done there.

11 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: They do have their plan of
12 action, if anybody would like to see it. I just got
13 it yesterday, so I didn't really have time to run
14 through and make a whole bunch of copies to get out
15 to you. I have read it. It does look like a good
16 action plan.

17 The officers that are in place, I talk to them,
18 usually, at least twice a week. Between the
19 Commander, the Adjutant and the finance officer,
20 they have lots of questions on how to get up and
21 running. They are trying to, it does seem they are
22 trying to do the right thing.

23 I'm not disputing what you want, Bob. I'm just
24 giving my side of the story.

25 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: I'm going to ask you a

1 question about that.

2 Does that show what they're doing, or planning
3 to do, with their Post?

4 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.

5 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: The body needs to know
6 that.

7 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yeah.

8 "Reopen the Post and rededicate it to serving
9 the community, supporting Legion programs and
10 initiatives through fundraising and by offering a
11 place for veterans, military personnel and the
12 public to gather."

13 I know they've already got their lighting in
14 the parking lot. Lowes has agreed to honor the
15 lighting price that was struck right before it got
16 closed. They are working on the roof right now.
17 They're needing more funds to fix the inside of the
18 building up. They don't have enough funds to get
19 past the roof yet. But that does not say that in
20 this document (indicating). This is from talking to
21 the Commander.

22 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Can I say something
23 else?

24 My suggestion would be, if this body wants to
25 give them a temporary approval, subject to myself

1 and Bob Klostermeier going back there and doing an
2 inspection as to what has changed, and possibly
3 contacting the, he is now deputy chief, to see what
4 the law enforcement has to say about it. Okay?
5 That would be my only contingency. Otherwise, I
6 would say we go ahead and do it. But right now I
7 would say temporary, so we can --

8 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I'd like to hear from the
9 District Commander also. I know he's worked with
10 them.

11 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: Bob Mason, 5th
12 District Commander. I got some positives and some
13 negatives on this.

14 I have talked to their Commander numerous
15 times. I actually have visited them in a meeting.

16 And I will say this about their membership. At
17 the time I went to their meeting, they had a
18 membership of about 33. Over 20 members was at a
19 meeting. How many of us in this room can say we
20 have that? Granted, it's not very many members, but
21 how many of us can say, "I have that percentage of
22 membership at our meeting"? That's a good sign.

23 I did go with the Commander, and I believe it
24 was his Adjutant. We went and inspected the
25 property. And at that time, if you had come and

1 asked what you asked today, I would say absolutely
2 not. The reason for that is, since that Post has
3 closed, as with any building that is not being used,
4 that place was falling down.

5 I recommended to them they absolutely, No. 1,
6 the location, the situation, I recommended that they
7 absolutely did not try to put any money in that
8 building because, basically, it needed tore down and
9 rebuilt. It was in that bad of a shape. The
10 critters, the coons, I think some of it was probably
11 homeless, the place was destroyed.

12 I would like to go back before we do anything
13 also, as well, as like Bob said. We need to look at
14 this.

15 Because I also took them to look at another
16 building that same day, to maybe lease or purchase.
17 I realize it takes money that, at the time, they
18 really didn't have. But the Veterans Service
19 Commissioner from Richland County also spoke to me
20 that they've got buildings available for purchase
21 for like a buck that would get them out of that
22 neighborhood.

23 And at the time, there was an investor wanting
24 to buy their bidding. The problem with that was he
25 expected them to give it to him. I mean, they've

1 got the property there. It wasn't realistic. It
2 wasn't fair to them either that, because of the
3 situation, this guy owns a golf course, he wants to
4 tear that all down and expand on their golf course.
5 That side of it really wasn't fair to the Post, the
6 Legionnaires.

7 And maybe they've done a lot more work since
8 the last time I talked to their Commander, but I've
9 talked to him several times this year.

10 And I do, I agree with Bob. Before we do
11 anything, as a District Commander, I need to go back
12 and visit them.

13 And like you said, we need to look. That may
14 not be the best thing for them, to go back into that
15 building, unless they've sunk a lot of money into
16 it. Because when I looked at pictures online when I
17 first got involved, I was like, wow, they've got an
18 awesome building here. When they took me and showed
19 me the building, it was like, "Really? You guys met
20 in this?"

21 And, literally, it was falling down, big holes,
22 doors tore off of it, water everywhere. While we
23 were there, we could see the, I'm assuming they were
24 coons or groundhogs or something, beating on the
25 insides of the walls there. Because we never even

1 got in the bidding. We had to look at everything
2 from the outside.

3 So I'm not sure that, at this point, unless we
4 meet with them, that letting them reopen that
5 building is actually a good thing.

6 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Bob and I are on the
7 same page.

8 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Okay. That's up to you
9 guys. I can't ask for anything. That's up to the
10 big guy over here (indicating).

11 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Well, at this
12 particular point in time, I'd recommend we not give
13 them approval to move back into that facility until
14 we have an opportunity to see exactly what they plan
15 on doing and what has been done. But I know the
16 shape of that building before it sat now for a
17 couple years or so.

18 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Let's bring the information
19 back to this body. Then we'll make a choice then on
20 how we proceed.

21 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: That's all of my stuff.

22 Do you want to go over Nutrisippy any more?

23 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: I have a question on
24 that. Suzette Heller, 12th District 1st Vice.

25 Are we preventing them from revenue? I mean is

1 that a, from a legal standpoint, do we, is there
2 grounds for us, other than obviously the condition
3 of their building, but if they haven't been
4 condemned by the county or the city or whatever, are
5 we preventing them from revenue? So does that, I
6 mean, are we bringing something onto ourselves by
7 preventing them from any kind of revenue?

8 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: They did not want to lose
9 their charter. And that was, the next step would
10 have been the removal of their charter. So they
11 agreed not to use their Post home anymore.

12 So, yes, they are being prevented by our asking
13 not to use that facility anymore. This body had
14 agreed, or made the motion to either remove their
15 charter or they would no longer use their facility.

16 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Based on the
17 legal --

18 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.

19 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: -- things that were
20 happening with the sheriff, right, Bob?

21 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes. It was the law issue,
22 yes.

23 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Right.

24 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Yeah. When you have a
25 drug party, and the Commander's car and his sister's

1 car get full of bullet holes, as well as the
2 building and stuff like that, and the police
3 department can't even get down there because there's
4 so many cars, you know.

5 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah.

6 So I'm also thinking about the request for them
7 to re-enter their building, too. It is springtime.
8 They do like to have parties in their parking lot.
9 Right?

10 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Well ever since they
11 moved out, law enforcement hasn't had an issue
12 because they've never contacted me.

13 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Right.

14 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: That may be an issue.

15 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah.

16 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: I don't know what
17 stopped it.

18 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Well they were, they
19 were in their parking lot. They were not
20 necessarily in the building, but they were in the
21 parking lot.

22 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Correct.

23 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Right.

24 So they were blocking off --

25 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: The parking lot has been

1 chained off and nobody is able to get in.

2 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: But previously, --

3 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.

4 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: -- they were
5 partying in the parking lot. They were set up in
6 the parking lot is what the issue was.

7 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: They own eight parcels
8 there.

9 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Right.

10 So they were, basically, the Post was happening
11 outside the building.

12 FROM THE FLOOR: Right.

13 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: It still comes down to
14 the fact that the building is a piece of crap.

15 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah.

16 ALTERNATE NEC SCHMITT: Bob said it needs to be
17 tore down.

18 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: Bob Mason, 5th
19 District Commander.

20 I don't know if this will necessarily answer
21 Suzette's question. I will say this: They meet in
22 a, it used to be a part of the Mansfield City School
23 system. Now it's kind of a private school type
24 thing. They do meet in there and they meet
25 regularly. They have their monthly meetings.

1 So, at the time that I spoke with them, you
2 know, we were actively, and they were actively,
3 looking for someplace else because of that building
4 and that property.

5 But they can still, and they've been offered,
6 at the other Post in Mansfield, they were also
7 offered to use that Post for their meetings.

8 Now, that being said, if you go into another
9 Post, then it becomes a question, okay, if we have
10 the gaming machines in there, who gets the money and
11 things like that. So I don't know. We didn't get
12 into any of that. But I do know that they were
13 offered the opportunity to have their meetings in
14 the other Mansfield Post.

15 But they've got some really good people now
16 running as Commander, 1st Vice, 2nd Vice, and so on.
17 The leadership that they had at the time that
18 happened, most of that, it was under bad leadership
19 a lot, that allowed a lot of that stuff to happen.

20 But to say it would happen again, who knows?
21 It's not happening now.

22 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay. All right, we're
23 going to close this matter for now. Because a lot
24 of things the things we're saying could come back
25 and bite us later on, in a legal sense, or

1 standpoint.

2 NEC CHAPMAN: Commander. I'm confused about
3 what JD said about the charter. It's not required
4 that they actually have a Post home, a permanent
5 Post home, to maintain that charter.

6 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: No. And that was the
7 stipulation this body voted on in 2019, was either
8 we remove their charter and close their Post, or
9 they could keep their charter and meet somewhere
10 else.

11 NEC CHAPMAN: So they've kept their charter by
12 meeting somewhere else?

13 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.

14 NEC CHAPMAN: So the charter is really not an
15 issue here?

16 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: No.

17 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: No.

18 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I was referring to what
19 Suzette had asked.

20 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Mr. Commander, are
21 we still under new business?

22 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes.

23 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd
24 District Commander.

25 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: I'm finished.

1 COMMANDER WHATLEY: I'm finished.

2 JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Can we take a quick
3 break so we can talk?

4 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Executive session?

5 JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Just like two minutes.

6 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes.

7 JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: We need to take a quick
8 break.

9 (THEREUPON, A THE PROCEEDINGS STOOD IN RECESS).

10 COMMANDER WHATLEY: For the sake of time, we're
11 going to move on and we're going to come back to
12 this issue as soon as the Parliamentarian get back.

13 But right now we have Jason Rue up on
14 Charities.

15 PDC RUE: Thanks, Commander.

16 In January, the team of The American Legion
17 Department of Ohio Charities, Inc., met during the
18 2025 Mid-Winter Conference.

19 The following are the latest recipients of
20 grants totaling nearly \$375,000: The American
21 Legion District Auxiliaries, The American Legion
22 Districts, which the Auxiliaries each got \$1,000,
23 the Districts that applied each got \$5,000 for The
24 Legion, and the SAL Districts each got \$1,000, if
25 they applied; American Legion Post 109, Montpelier,

1 got money; American Legion Post 138, in Hamilton;
2 American Legion Post 142, in Waverly; American
3 Legion Post 164, in Grove City; American Legion Post
4 186, in Lebanon; American Legion Post 215, in Eaton;
5 American Legion Post 343, in Euclid; American Legion
6 Darke County Council, their vets museum; the Civil
7 Air Patrol; Clermont Housing Corporation, the
8 homeless vets, in Batavia; Cleveland VA Medical
9 Research, their para-rowing program; Dan Fout
10 Memorial Disabled Veterans Hunt, in Canal
11 Winchester; Department of Ohio programs; Disabled
12 Veterans Outdoors, in New Lexington; Forever Amber
13 Acres, in Medina; Joseph House, in Cincinnati;
14 MIA/Vets Memorial, American Legion Post 697, in
15 Perry; the Motts Museum in Groveport; National Lead
16 Candidate Fund; Ride With Valor, in Strongsville;
17 the Ronald McDonald House in Cincinnati; Stockhands
18 Horses for Healing in Delaware; Treats 4 the Streets
19 in Pickerington, the VA Central Ohio Healthcare
20 System Programs; and Walk the Talk Outreach, in
21 Circleville.

22 Once again, Charities, Inc., takes requests
23 twice a year. Either e-mail them or go online and
24 submit the form through Department. You can mail it
25 in to Department and they'll make sure that we get

1 it.

2 Any questions?

3 Yes, Holly.

4 TREASURER LEWIS: Holly Lewis, Department
5 Treasurer.

6 Are you proceeding with an audit?

7 PDC RUE: We're having a meeting next week
8 about that.

9 TREASURER LEWIS: Okay, good.

10 PDC RUE: That will be brought up in our
11 meeting next week.

12 TREASURER LEWIS: Uh-huh.

13 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
14 District.

15 May we ask how much the donation was to Ride
16 With Valor?

17 PDC RUE: Ride With Valor, let's see if I've
18 got it on here, \$2,000, which is what they
19 requested.

20 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay.

21 PDC RUE: All right, that's my report,
22 Commander.

23 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you, Jason.

24 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Thank you, Jason.

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: We're moving right on to

1 good of the American Legion.

2 (Applause).

3 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Commander, Emmons,
4 3rd District.

5 The Judge Advocate and the Parliamentarian are
6 out. So I don't know if we need to wait until they
7 come back, but I can't figure out the process if I
8 want to put a Post in the 3rd District under
9 suspension and remove their charter. It's Post 613.
10 We have a plan of action in place on what I've
11 requested for them to do. But I would like them to
12 officially be on record.

13 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It has to be a written
14 document and submitted to us. And we can do that --
15 Robinson, Adjutant -- we can do that going into the
16 DEC for convention.

17 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Okay, thank you.

18 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Are we good to move on?

19 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: Yes. Thank you.

20 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Good of The Legion and
21 announcements.

22 1VC OREN: Thank you, Commander.

23 We've got a message from a Vermont Post. And
24 they're looking to come to Ohio for a hunting trip.
25 And they're asking if there's anybody who would be

1 willing to talk to them about it. They have five to
2 ten Legionnaires. And they've got campers and
3 stuff. They're just looking for a place to have
4 them.

5 Last year, they went to Pennsylvania.

6 So if there's anybody interested in doing some
7 help getting some hunters in, see JD.

8 Thank you.

9 COORDINATOR WHITE: I jumped in line because
10 they want me to be quick and shut up.

11 So, just a reminder, Buckeye Boys State is held
12 at Miami University, Sunday, June 8th through Sunday
13 June 15th. Anyone is welcome to come out and see.

14 FROM THE FLOOR: June?

15 COORDINATOR WHITE: June. What did I say?

16 FROM THE FLOOR: July (sic).

17 COORDINATOR WHITE: Show up whenever.

18 Everyone is welcome to come out and see the
19 program. You don't have to stay the whole time.
20 You can just stay for a couple days.

21 If you are wanting to come out and see Buckeye
22 Boys State, see what happens, please let me know.
23 You have to fill out a housing form if you are going
24 to require housing. You also have to fill out a
25 background check. And we also need a medical form

1 in case, God forbid, something happens while you are
2 there.

3 So, anyone is welcome. Everything is free of
4 charge to you. You get free chow, you get free
5 housing, and we pay for your background check too.

6 So Buckeye Boys State is having a meeting next
7 week, if anyone wants to attend that.

8 But like I said, if anyone wants to come out
9 and visit the program, just let me know and I'll get
10 you your paperwork.

11 Department Convention is July 11th to
12 July 13th. It's in Independence, Ohio again.

13 Everyone should have the flyer on how to
14 register in your packet. You just have to call the
15 Holiday Inn and make your reservation. It's \$129 a
16 night.

17 The deadline for hotel rooms is June 10th. So
18 make sure that you book your hotel rooms before June
19 10th.

20 We have overflow rooms in the Candlewood Suites
21 that's attached to the Holiday Inn. We also have a
22 small room block that is reserved in the, I believe
23 it's Springhill Suites, that's across the parking
24 lot, in case we take up all of the rooms in Holiday
25 Inn and Candlewood.

1 Any questions on Boys State or Department
2 Convention?

3 10TH DISTRICT CMDR MAROTTO: One more time,
4 Christie, if you could give us -- Howard Marotto,
5 District 10.

6 Could you give us the dates on the District
7 Convention again, please, I mean Department
8 Convention?

9 COORDINATOR WHITE: Department Convention is
10 July 11th through July 13th.

11 So Boys State is in June. Department
12 Convention is in July.

13 10TH DISTRICT CMDR MAROTTO: Thank you.

14 HISTORIAN BEYER: Al Beyer, Post 523.

15 I'm just curious. Has anything been said to
16 the hotel about security in the parking lot?

17 COORDINATOR WHITE: About security?

18 HISTORIAN BEYER: Yeah.

19 COORDINATOR WHITE: Was there an issue last
20 year?

21 HISTORIAN BEYER: Well, we had an issue with
22 Gary's truck.

23 COORDINATOR WHITE: That was Mid-Winter, Al.

24 2VC COX, JR.: That was at Mid-Winter when my
25 truck got broke into.

1 HISTORIAN BEYER: Oh, okay.

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: That was Mid-Winter. And
3 they had security in the parking lot this year at
4 Mid-Winter.

5 HISTORIAN BEYER: Well, the question still
6 stands though. Do they have security there?

7 COORDINATOR WHITE: I can check with them.
8 There weren't any issues last year, so we didn't
9 talk to the hotel about it. But I can talk to them.

10 TREASURER LEWIS: I have a question. Holly
11 Lewis, Treasurer.

12 The DEC is on the 10th, though, right?

13 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yeah.

14 FROM THE FLOOR: Yes.

15 What time?

16 COORDINATOR WHITE: What?

17 TREASURER LEWIS: Somebody wanted to know what
18 time the DEC was.

19 COORDINATOR WHITE: The same as it usually is.

20 FROM THE FLOOR: It's 3:00 o'clock. I received
21 a calendar invite.

22 COORDINATOR WHITE: 3:00 o'clock?

23 FROM THE FLOOR: 3:00 o'clock.

24 TREASURER LEWIS: 3:00 o'clock.

25 FROM THE FLOOR: On the 10th?

1 Yeah.

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: I'm sure that you're going
3 to receive a letter, a call, or something.

4 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

5 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: All right, a few more
6 announcements for the good of The Legion.

7 National Spring Meetings are Monday, May 5th
8 through May 8th, in Indianapolis. Several of us
9 have call-ins for that.

10 The 61st Detachment Convention will be Friday,
11 May 6th through Sunday May 18th, at the Quality Inn
12 in Chillicothe. There are several hotels available.
13 Please reach out if you want to go. It is a lot
14 different than the Department Convention, but it is
15 a lot of fun.

16 National Convention. We are in Tampa this
17 year. The Commander and I just got back from a site
18 visit.

19 The first thing I'm going to tell you is think
20 of Charlotte. There is not a lot of things to do
21 right around the hotel. There's a few restaurants,
22 a few pubs. We are about two blocks from catching
23 the trolley.

24 If you are planning on using the trolley to get
25 to the convention center, give yourself ample time.

1 There are regular civilians that use that every day.
2 We are a guest in their neighborhood. So give
3 yourself plenty of time. Make sure that you are
4 using the correct trolley. It runs both ways and
5 there are two different lines. There's a red line
6 and a blue line.

7 This will all be sent out in the e-mails. But
8 make sure that you're paying attention, that you
9 don't end up down in, you'll end up in the next town
10 down instead of at the convention center. So watch
11 what you're doing and give yourself ample time.

12 We are a mile from the convention center. It
13 is a good 20-minute walk in decent weather. It will
14 be hot, humid, so make sure you take your water your
15 drinking.

16 The Ohio Party. We are working with a Post. I
17 know we like having our tri-party that we had with
18 Michigan and Iowa. None of the Adjutants, working
19 together, could find something that we all could
20 agree on.

21 So the Commander and I did a tour of the area.
22 What we came up with is a Post. The Post was
23 originally built for a staging depot for Teddy
24 Roosevelt and his Rough Riders before they went to
25 Cuba. It was two stories when it was originally

1 built. Over the years, a hurricane blew off the top
2 story. In the past year it has been hit by three
3 hurricanes and they are still rebuilding. Their
4 canteen, their kitchen, bathrooms, all immaculate,
5 all reopened. But it sits right on the Gulf. It is
6 a beautiful, picturesque setting.

7 And we are looking at having busing to go out
8 there. We're working on all that. As soon as I get
9 updates, I will make more of that known.

10 National Commander will be coming in to Dayton
11 on June 30th through July 3rd. We will be having a
12 large dinner at Post 598. I believe that we are
13 going to see if they will do it on July 2nd.

14 Shirt and polo shirt, family shirt order forms.
15 We have a punch of them printed out there. They are
16 printed in black and white instead of color. I
17 apologize.

18 The incoming Commander's shirt is a bright
19 green shirt. Think of your Mountain Dew bottle.
20 Normally I have one sitting here. They look really
21 cool. They came out nice.

22 FROM THE FLOOR: They don't have pockets.

23 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: They do not have pockets.
24 That material doesn't come with pockets.

25 Stan, I told him I know a seamstress. I'll

1 take his and get a pocket sewn on. We're going to
2 put a purple pocket on it for him.

3 But that is all of my updates. Does anybody
4 have any questions of me?

5 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Now, Suzette Heller,
6 12th District 1st Vice. I don't have any questions
7 for you, JD. But I do want to go back to the 676
8 issue and just put this to bed. I just want to
9 say --

10 COMMANDER WHATLEY: No, no, no.

11 JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: We've actually discussed
12 this.

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yeah, yeah.

14 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: I just want to say
15 that I make a motion, and I just want to put this on
16 record, that I would say the 5th District Commander,
17 with the Department Commander and the Adjutant,
18 highly stresses to the leadership of Post 676 that
19 they not re-enter that building. Yeah, I just want
20 to say that.

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: She put a motion on the
22 floor.

23 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yes.

24 COMMANDER WHATLEY: I need a second.

25 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: I second that.

1 TREASURER LEWIS: Mason, 5th District.

2 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: Mason, 5th district,
3 seconds it.

4 COMMANDER WHATLEY: The motion has been
5 properly made and seconded.

6 Any discussion?

7 NEC CHAPMAN: Is that going to be -- Chapman,
8 NEC -- is that going to be a task force that you're
9 sending out there then, with Bob and Bob and --

10 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes.

11 Can you amend your motion to send a task force,
12 which is going to be Bob and Past Commander
13 Klostermeier, and the Commander, Bob, Bob and Bob?

14 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah, I'll amend my
15 motion, Commander, that you put a task force
16 together for that.

17 I'm not sure that you want to send an NECman
18 out to that, because now you've just included
19 National on that. And so I think Mr. Seavey, at
20 National, would probably appreciate that you not do
21 that. So I would say, I would say you put a task
22 force together, but I would recommend not putting an
23 NECman on that task force.

24 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: That would be correct.

25 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Yeah.

1 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay.

2 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: So I will amend the
3 motion, Commander, that you send a task force
4 together out to Post 676, and for them to not
5 re-enter that building.

6 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay, you've heard the new
7 amendment. Do I get a second on that?

8 TREASURER LEWIS: It is already seconded.

9 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay.

10 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: Mason, 5th District,
11 I second it. I'll second the amended motion.

12 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay. The motion has been
13 properly made and seconded.

14 Any discussion?

15 10TH DISTRICT CMDR MAROTTO: Commander, sir,
16 Marotto, 10th District.

17 I just happened to see a Facebook page that
18 says they're open on June 5th, for an event.

19 COMMANDER WHATLEY: That's beyond my knowledge.

20 JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: I'm just going to
21 address this, since I'm your attorney.

22 So, the Post is a separate corporation. And we
23 charter them to be an American Legion Post.

24 So what we're going to do, what Suzette is
25 asking, is to make a recommendation to them and put

1 together a task force that will make further
2 recommendations to them.

3 And so that has nothing to do with, you know,
4 what they may or may not be doing. And I think that
5 there is no need for us to speculate as to what they
6 may or may not be doing, or what may or may not be
7 happening there.

8 We're going to look into it and do the best we
9 can. Understood?

10 Thank you.

11 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

12 Any other discussion?

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

14 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none --

15 PDC KLOSTERMEIER: Commander, Past Department
16 Commander Klostermeier.

17 First of all, Bob and I have been involved in
18 this thing for quite some time, going back to 2019.
19 We made several visits there. We've been inside
20 that building. That building is not even worth
21 standing anymore. There's holes in the walls,
22 everything.

23 But I think, as far as the task force goes, if
24 Mr. Schmitt goes in as a Past Department Commander
25 and not Alternate NEC. I think that will be just

1 fine.

2 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

3 Any others?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Hearing none, all for it by
6 saying aye.

7 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

8 COMMANDER WHATLEY: All against, no.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

10 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Motion carries.

11 Closing remarks.

12 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: Commander, Mason, 5th
13 District. Commander, before you go into your
14 closing remarks, may I have the floor for a couple
15 presentations, please?

16 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes.

17 For me?

18 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: Yes, sir.

19 Commander, I have two presentations, sir.

20 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay.

21 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: The first one here is
22 from the nearly 9,000 Legionnaires of the fighting
23 5th District. We would like to give \$500 towards
24 your Commander's project.

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

1 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: So that's for that.

2 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay.

3 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: And then another
4 presentation, sir. This was not ready for your
5 Commander's Homecoming.

6 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Okay.

7 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: But it's kind of odd.
8 And I have to say this because you brought up at
9 your Commander's Homecoming about respect.

10 And if you recall, a few years back, you and I
11 both attended some classes in the Buckeye American
12 Legion College together.

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Uh-huh.

14 5TH DISTRICT CMDR MASON: One in particular
15 that Ms. Lewis had taught.

16 And afterwards, you and I had a very long
17 conversation. I went back to my room and I told my
18 wife, I said I have a lot of respect for that young
19 man. I still do.

20 But that being said, I just thought it was odd
21 that you brought that up.

22 This was not here in time. Again, on behalf of
23 the nearly 9,000 Legionnaires of the fighting 5th
24 District, we would like to present you with this
25 gift (indicating).

1 (Applause).

2 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: You have another one, a
3 couple more, actually.

4 3RD DISTRICT CMDR EMMONS: We've got the
5 tickets for the vets that Christie mentioned
6 earlier.

7 FROM THE FLOOR: Who are you again?

8 1ST DISTRICT CMDR MAHLMAN: Hey, Mark Mahlman,
9 1st District Commander.

10 I have two checks here from our Post, one for
11 Children and Youth and one for Gifts for Yanks, for
12 1500 apiece.

13 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

14 (Applause).

15 Thank you.

16 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: One more.

17 COMMANDER WHATLEY: One more?

18 ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Two more.

19 NEC CHAPMAN: Commander, Post 288,
20 Williamsburg, Ohio, Gifts to the Yanks, \$500.

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

22 (Applause).

23 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Commander, I do have
24 a good of The Legion. Are you okay with that?

25 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Yes, ma'am.

1 12TH DISTRICT 1VC HELLER: Okay.

2 Just really quick, Ohio State Veterans Homes,
3 there is a movement right now to put an additional
4 veterans home in the Columbus area. Okay?

5 Buck Bramlish, out of the Franklin County
6 Veterans Service Commission, has done a lot of
7 research on acquiring a state veterans home in the
8 Columbus area. It will serve the surrounding 11
9 counties.

10 But central Ohio is really in need of a state
11 veterans home. We've been having this conversation
12 for the last 12 years.

13 So, out of the 163 state veterans homes
14 nationally, Ohio only has two homes. And they're
15 very polar opposite. One is up in Sandusky, which
16 is really antiquated, and obviously the other one is
17 down in Georgetown.

18 So Ohio is the seventh largest veterans state,
19 with almost 700,000 veterans. And central Ohio is
20 two hours from either home, and over an hour from
21 Sandusky. So a lot of veterans will not travel. So
22 a lot of veterans' families will not travel. And so
23 it is more expensive to have a veteran stay at a
24 local community care center, is what they're calling
25 it.

1 And a lot of times you just can't go visit a
2 veteran who's in one of these places locally.

3 Right? So they're not very veteran friendly.

4 And so central Ohio is really in need of this.
5 However, the waiting list is so long.

6 Right now, Ohio is, there's a bill on the
7 floor, with all of the money that DOGE is doing,
8 there's Dave Taylor, Congressman, he is asking
9 Congress to take some of that money and wipe out all
10 the balance of what's remaining for all the monies
11 for all these veteran home projects.

12 And right now, for Sandusky and Georgetown,
13 they're about 13 or 14 on this list. And they've
14 been on this list for probably about seven, eight
15 years. And so if they were to do that, this project
16 still would be at least another five or six years to
17 get done.

18 And so our government, our state government,
19 would have to approve \$35 million, just to get on
20 the list. Okay? And then there would be additional
21 fundraising that would need to happen.

22 Now Michigan has already done this. They've
23 already built two homes. So they're doing something
24 right up in Michigan. So they've built two homes
25 and they're getting ready to build a third home. So

1 they will have, then, five homes for their veterans.

2 So we need to do something. We need to take
3 some action. We need to rally around this
4 conversation and really start talking to our
5 legislators and our congressionals about getting an
6 additional state veterans home. Because all of us
7 here are going to want to be in that home, if you're
8 in the 6th District, the 12th District, the 8th
9 District, the 7th District, the 10th District, even
10 the 3rd District or the 5th District, if I already
11 said that.

12 So I have a lot of information here. There's a
13 lot of research that's been done on this. Please
14 see me.

15 Buck is retiring in the next year or two. He
16 would like to do some town halls in your Districts
17 to talk about this, to get a grassroots movement
18 going about the veterans home in Columbus. Okay?

19 All right, that's all I have, Commander. Thank
20 you.

21 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you.

22 I'm just waiting. Because every time I start
23 to talk, somebody going to hold their hand up.

24 1ST DISTRICT CMDR MAHLMAN: Mark Mahlman, 1st
25 District.

1 Just letting you know, real quick, we got a
2 member from Hamler Post 262. His uncle is coming
3 home World War II, through the DNA of his mother and
4 from his first cousin. They acquired his remains
5 and they will be coming home at the end of May.

6 Requesting a Riders's escort from maybe Detroit
7 Airport to Dupont, Ohio, and then maybe from the
8 service there to the burial site. I will be getting
9 in touch when we have our District Rider meeting
10 tomorrow. So I will bring that upon them.

11 That's all I have, sir.

12 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Thank you. Thank you.

13 First, I would like to thank all the officers
14 for the great job you've done thus far in improving
15 the Department of Ohio.

16 And especially our Department staff, they work
17 very, very hard. I appreciate you if no one else
18 does.

19 (Applause).

20 And Regional Vice Commander, thank you for
21 coming to visit us. I hope you take something back
22 that's positive and other Districts or Departments
23 can use. We really appreciate it.

24 And with that being said, we will have our
25 benediction from Robert White, Assistant Chaplain.

1 Please stand.

2 ASST CHAPLAIN WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Commander.

3 Before the benediction, some scripture, which I
4 hope will be embedded into our hearts as fertile
5 soil.

6 "But they that wait upon the Lord shall never
7 renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings
8 as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and
9 they shall walk, and not faint." Isaiah 40:31.

10 And now my brothers and sisters, the
11 benediction.

12 As we gather in the spirit of unity and
13 purpose, let us take a moment to reflect on the
14 blessings of the season of renewal, hope and faith.

15 Heavenly Father, we come before You with
16 gratitude for the strength and resilience found in
17 the community of The American Legion. We celebrate
18 the significance of this month, both in the
19 observance of Passover and the resurrection of
20 Easter, rejoicing in the promise of liberation and
21 new life.

22 In the words of scripture, we are reminded,
23 "For I know the planes (sic) and the plans I have
24 for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and
25 not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a

1 future." Jeremiah 29.11.

2 May this promise guide each one of us as we
3 seek to support our veterans and their families,
4 particularly in these last months of our membership
5 year. Let us be encouraged to give our best, to
6 serve with passion, and to uplift one another in our
7 common mission.

8 Grant us wisdom to lead with love and
9 compassion, and courage to function as agents of
10 hope in our communities. As we embrace the values
11 of loyalty, service and fellowship, may we inspire
12 others to join our ranks and further the noble cause
13 of The American Legion.

14 We seek Your guidance, Lord, that we may be
15 victors over the challenges we face. Protect us and
16 provide our needs, instilling in us a spirit of
17 perseverance and dedication.

18 May all who gather here be filled with Your
19 peace and strength, and may they carry this spirit
20 of cooperation and dedication into their everyday
21 lives.

22 Now let us go forth united in purpose and
23 empowered by faith.

24 In Your holy name, your servants pray. Amen.

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

1 COMMANDER WHATLEY: Cover.

2 Colors of our nation in place, hand salute.

3 Two.

4 . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .
